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Census 2021



- Key ingredient in formulas used to calculate local government funding.
- [First Digital-first census](#), took place during COVID-19. 88.9% of households responded online.
- Wandsworth had a Census response rate of 96% (London median 95%, England 97%).
- All key topics have been released and cover usual residential population by age and sex, number of households, migration, ethnicity, religion, languages, work, education, sexual orientation, health and care, housing and gender identity.
- ONS have released a whole host of interactive data products to facilitate exploration and understanding.

Examples of how local authorities use census information



Planning and development

Planners use census information to develop local plans that reflect future needs. It also informs funding bids by identifying inequalities at a local level.



Public health and social care

Local authorities use census information to understand service demand, identify pockets of health deprivation and support future care planning.



Education

Pupil forecasting models use census information to inform capital bids and to monitor the supply of qualified people.



Transport

Census information supports funding bids for road improvements and informs planning and profiles around changes to public transport.



Housing

Census information helps to measure housing affordability and assess local housing needs.



Other

Local Authorities use census information to inform emergency services, library services, and waste collection and disposal.

Covid Impact on the Census

- Covid is not expected to have impacted response rates or response quality.
- It likely collection during lockdown has picked up trends (e.g., health, location of work, hours of work, travel to work, where students were) that may not fully apply post-pandemic.
- The Census 2021 population is lower than what was expected pre-pandemic.
- Previous GLA analysis showed decrease in 18-25 population in London during the first year of the pandemic; the group is most likely to be involved in tourism, entertainment and hospitality sector. Preliminary GLA analysis show that since lifting of Covid restrictions population declines in this group and London overall have reversed.
- This reversal will not be picked up by Census 2021 as data was collected during lockdown in March 2021.

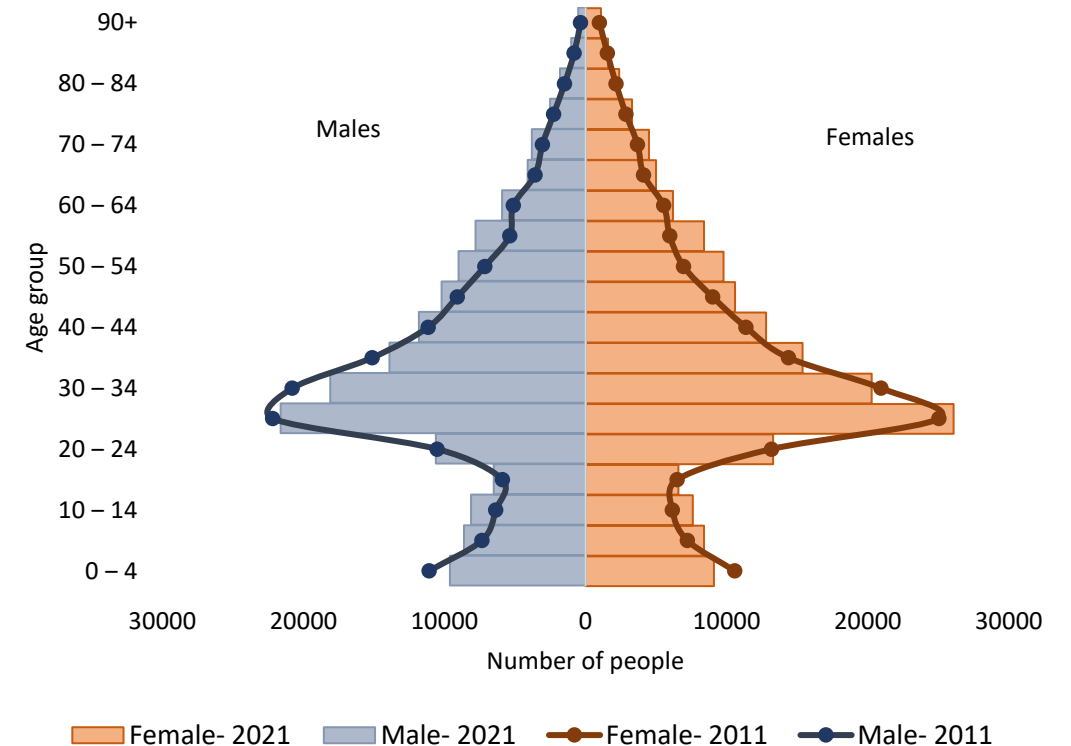
Summary – Population Increase

- Since the last Census, Wandsworth population has increased by +6.7%. The previous increase between 2001 and 2011 was +17.9%. Since 2011, London's population increased by +7.7%.
- Borough population grew by 20,505 residents from 2011 to 2021
- Wandsworth remained as the 8th largest borough in London; it is the 2nd largest borough in Inner London (after Newham).
- The median age in the borough is 33 years. This is lower than London (35 years) and England (40 years).
- Wandsworth is a popular place to live among young adults. Wandsworth currently has the 3rd highest percentage of 20-44 year olds in London (50%). Highest was Tower Hamlets (54.7%) then Islington.
- The borough has got older overall with the largest relative increase seen in the 45-64 year age group.

Borough Population

- Population of Wandsworth is 327,500
- 20,505 more residents than 2011 (+6.7% increase)
- Chart on the right shows that local population is now older.
- Largest increase seen in 55-59 year olds (+43% since 2011), followed by 50-54 (+33%)
- Largest decrease seen in 0-4 year olds (-14% since 2011)
- 137,400 households* in Wandsworth, 6,907 more since 2011 (+5.3% increase)
- The proportion of females is 53%, males is 47%, 2011 it was 52% and 48%, respectively. Since 2011, female population has grown (+9%) faster than male (+5%) population in Wandsworth.
- In 2021, among the 20-44 year olds, there are almost 11,000 more females locally than males.
- In 2021, locally there were 4,000 85+ year olds, 307 more (+8.3%) compared to 2011. The borough had the highest number of 85+ year olds in Inner London

Wandsworth Population Pyramid – Number of people by age 2021 vs. 2011



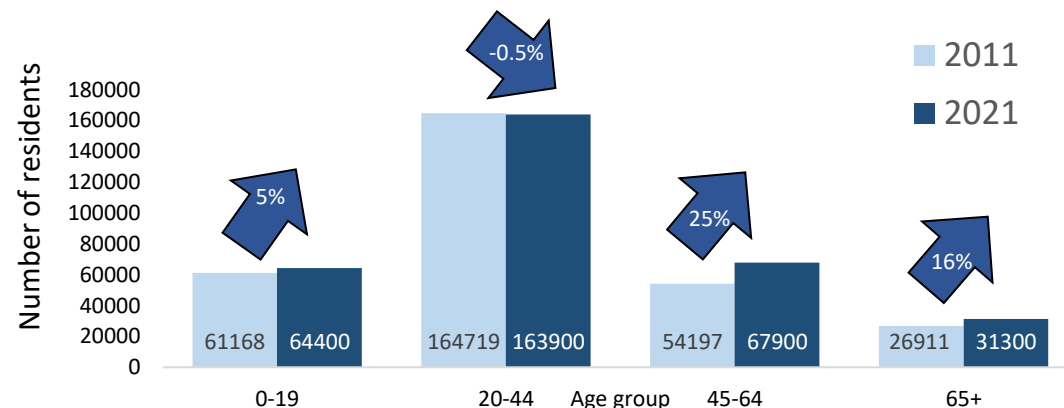
***Household**: one person living alone, or a group of people (not necessarily related) living at the same address who share cooking facilities and share a living room, sitting room or dining area

Borough Age Profile

- Half of the Wandsworth population are aged 20-44 years.
- Proportionally, the borough has the 3rd largest 20–44 year-old population in London and Inner London.
- In 2011, Wandsworth had the 2nd largest percentage of 20-44 year olds in London and Inner London, but a small decrease in this population (-0.5%) compared to a small increase across London as a whole (+1.5%) put the borough behind Tower Hamlets and Islington in 2021.
- This decrease could be linked to the pandemic and young adults, who are most likely to be employed in hospitality and tourism, leaving London during lockdown. GLA analyses indicates the decline has likely reversed since lifting of lockdown.
- Biggest increase was in 45-64 age group with a +25% increase, indicating that population is getting older. We need to wait for housing data but possibly this age group is staying put rather than moving out.
- Wandsworth has lower proportion of 0-19 years olds and 65+ adults than London and a much higher percentage of 20-44 years olds compared to London and England.

(* arrows show % increase/decrease in number of households)



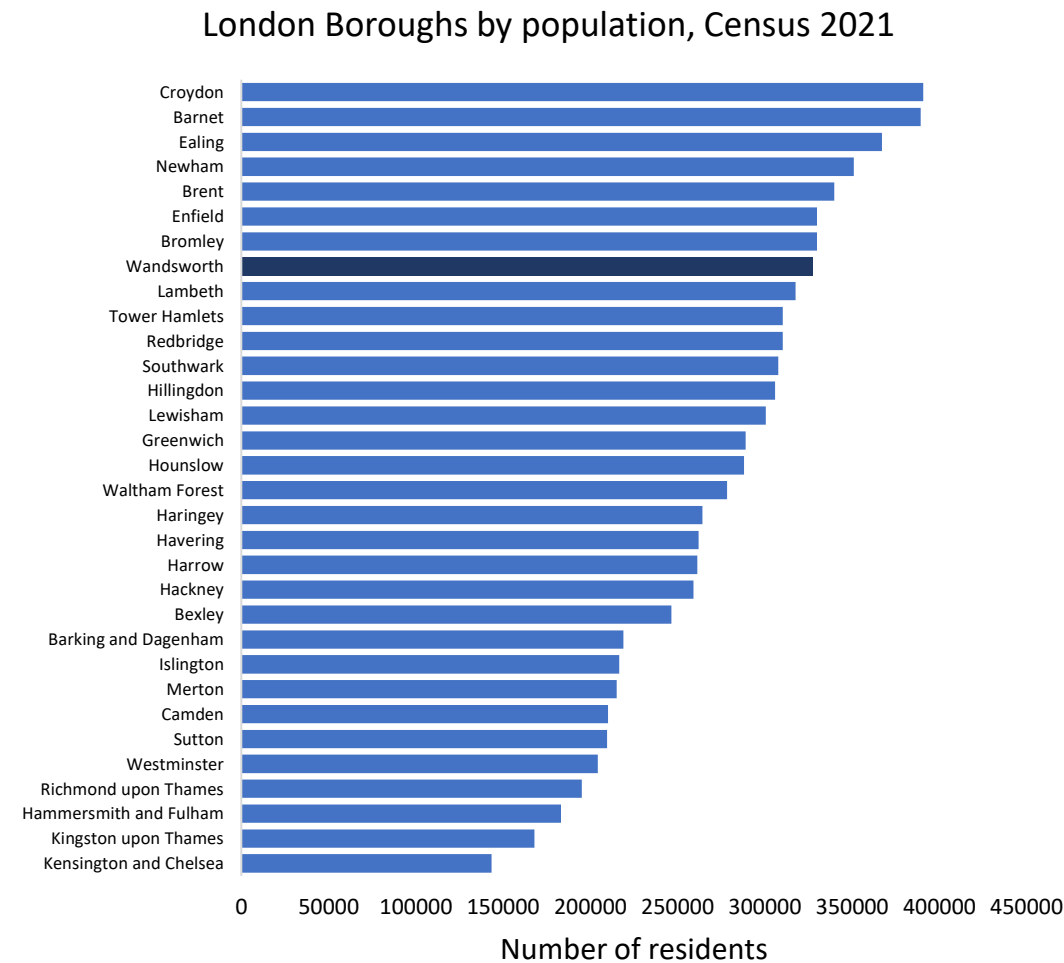
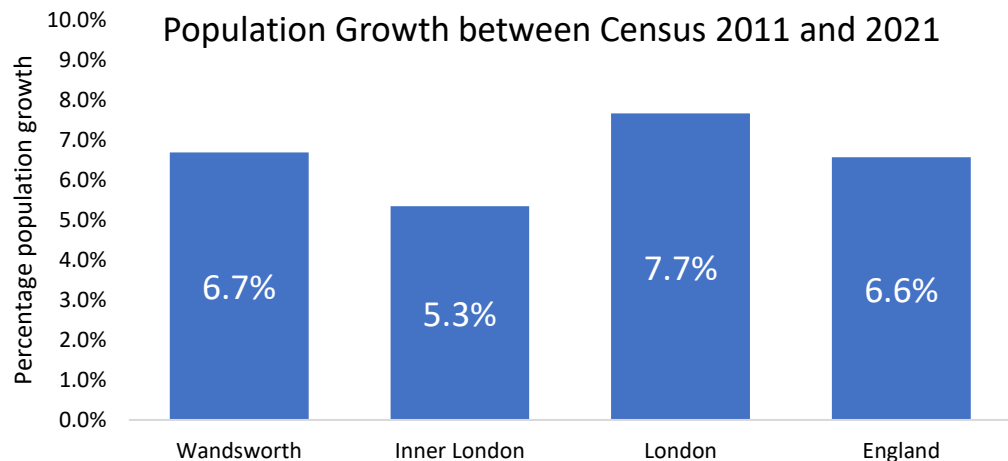
Age structure comparisons, Census 2021





London and England comparisons

- Wandsworth has the 8th largest population in London and the 2nd largest population in Inner London after Newham.
- Wandsworth is the 10th most densely populated local authority in London with 9,559 persons per km², but the second least densely populated in Inner London.
- Wandsworth's population has increased in size by +6.7% between 2011 and 2021. The population growth is higher than Inner London but lower than London.



London Trends

- London population of 8.8 million, increase of 626,000 (+7.7%) since 2011. Total of 3.42 million households in London, increase of 158,000 (+4.6%) since 2011
- Second largest region in England after South East. London growth rate was higher than England (+7.7% vs +6.3%)
- Population increased in all but three boroughs (K&C -9.6%, Westminster -6.9%, Camden -4.6%). Largest increase in Tower Hamlets (+22.1%), B&D (+17.7%), Newham (+14%),
- Population increase higher in Outer London than Inner London.
- London population has grown older, largest age group was now 30-34 years (2011 it was 25-29 years) but London's population is still much younger than the rest of the country. Economic migrants from within the UK and from overseas in their 20s and 30s give London its distinctive age structure.
- The older population is comparatively much smaller in London as people migrate away from the capital as they begin to form families and then later again as they move into retirement.

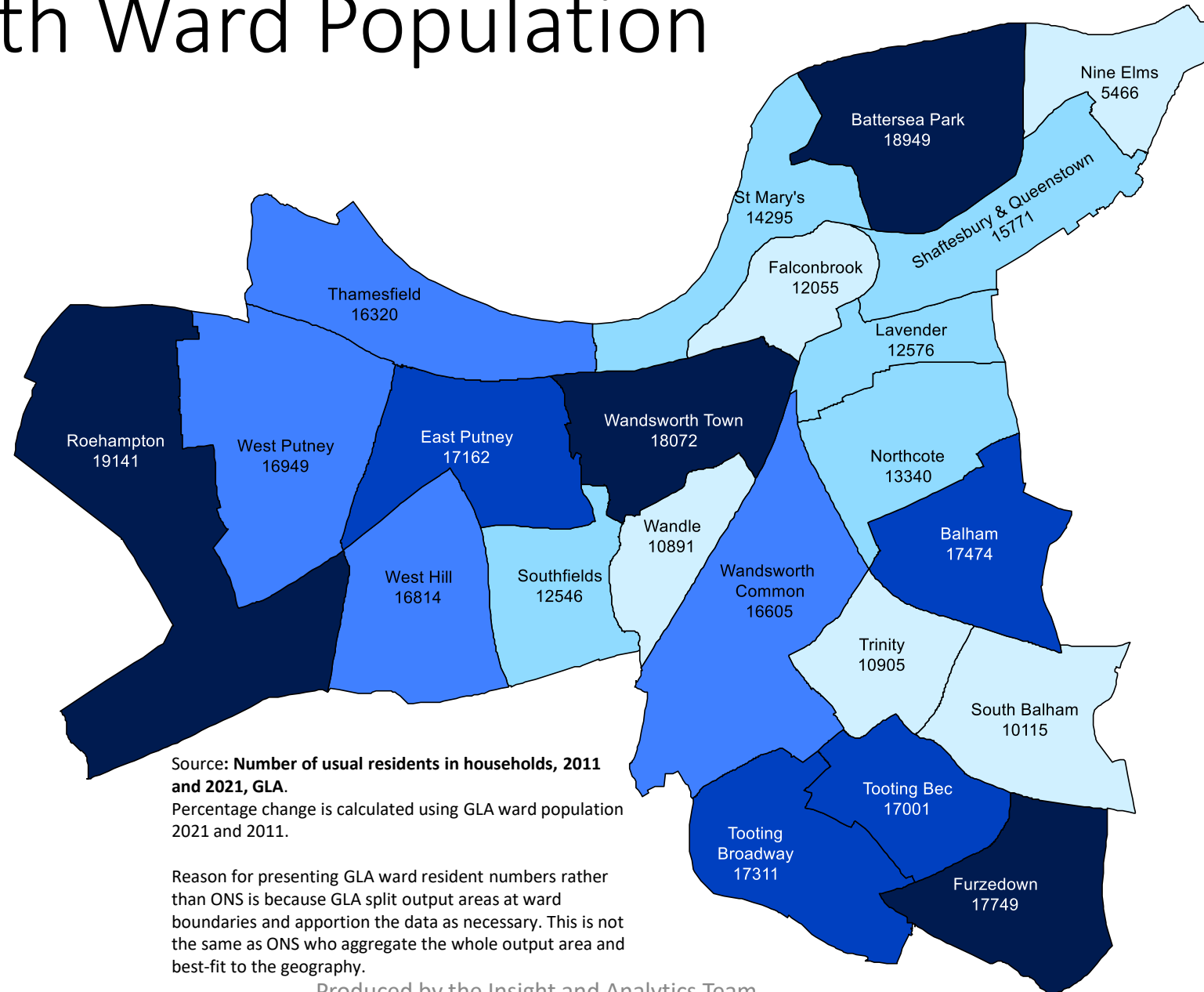
Wandsworth Ward Population – Census 2011 vs 2021

Summary – Ward population

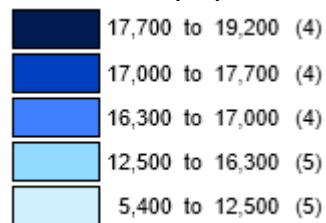
- More than half of population increase in Wandsworth came from just 4 wards - Nine Elms, St Mary's, Wandsworth Town and Thamesfield wards.
- There will be minor differences between ONS and GLA estimates for ward population
 - ONS will best-fit whole output areas, smallest aggregate census geography, to wards. ONS will produce ward population estimates in 2023.
 - GLA split output areas at ward boundaries and apportion the data as necessary to the relevant ward. This is the best current approach.

2021 Ward population

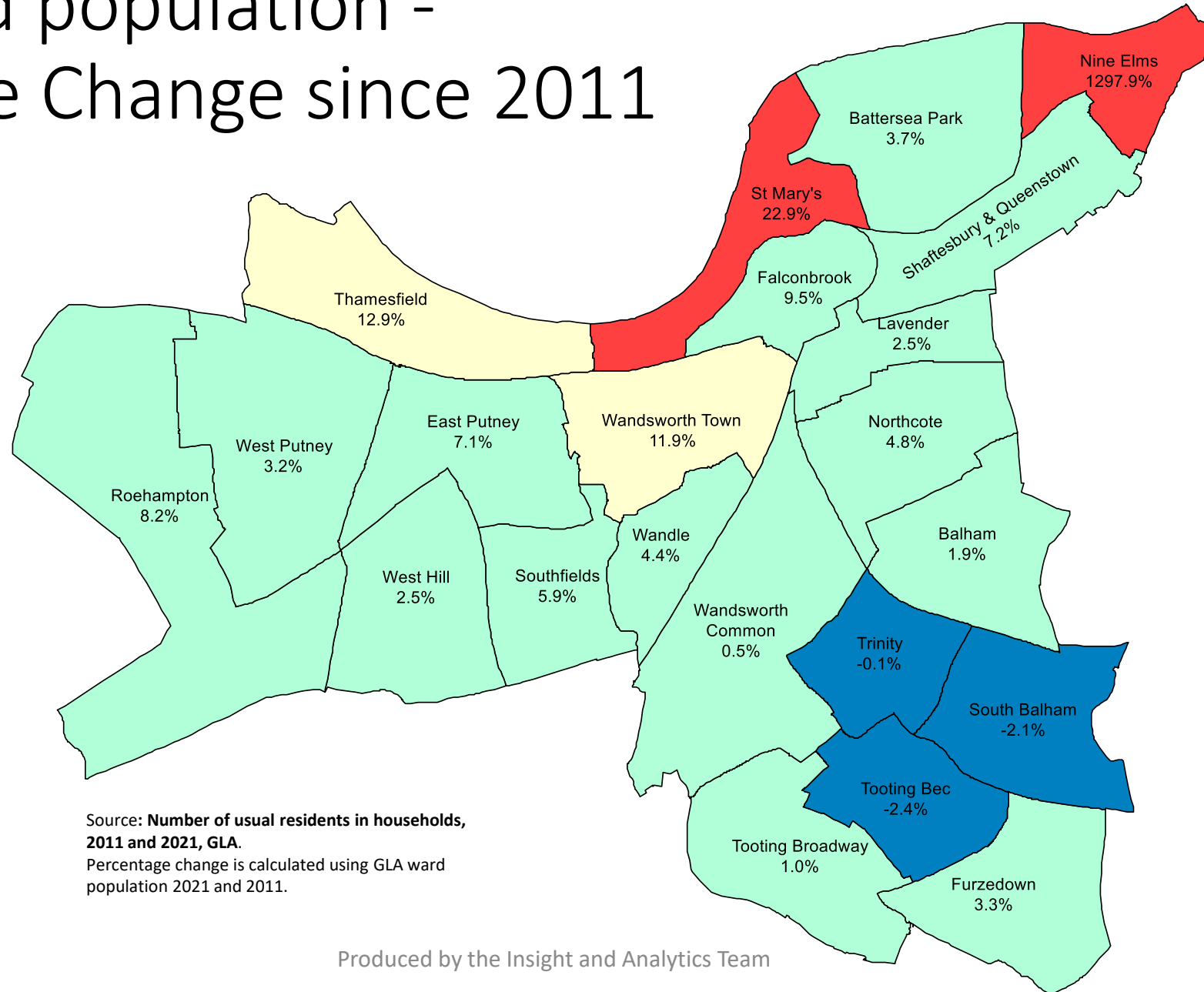

Reason for presenting GLA ward resident numbers rather than ONS is because GLA split output areas at ward boundaries and apportion the data as necessary. This is not the same as ONS who aggregate the whole output area and best-fit to the geography.

Summary – Living Arrangements

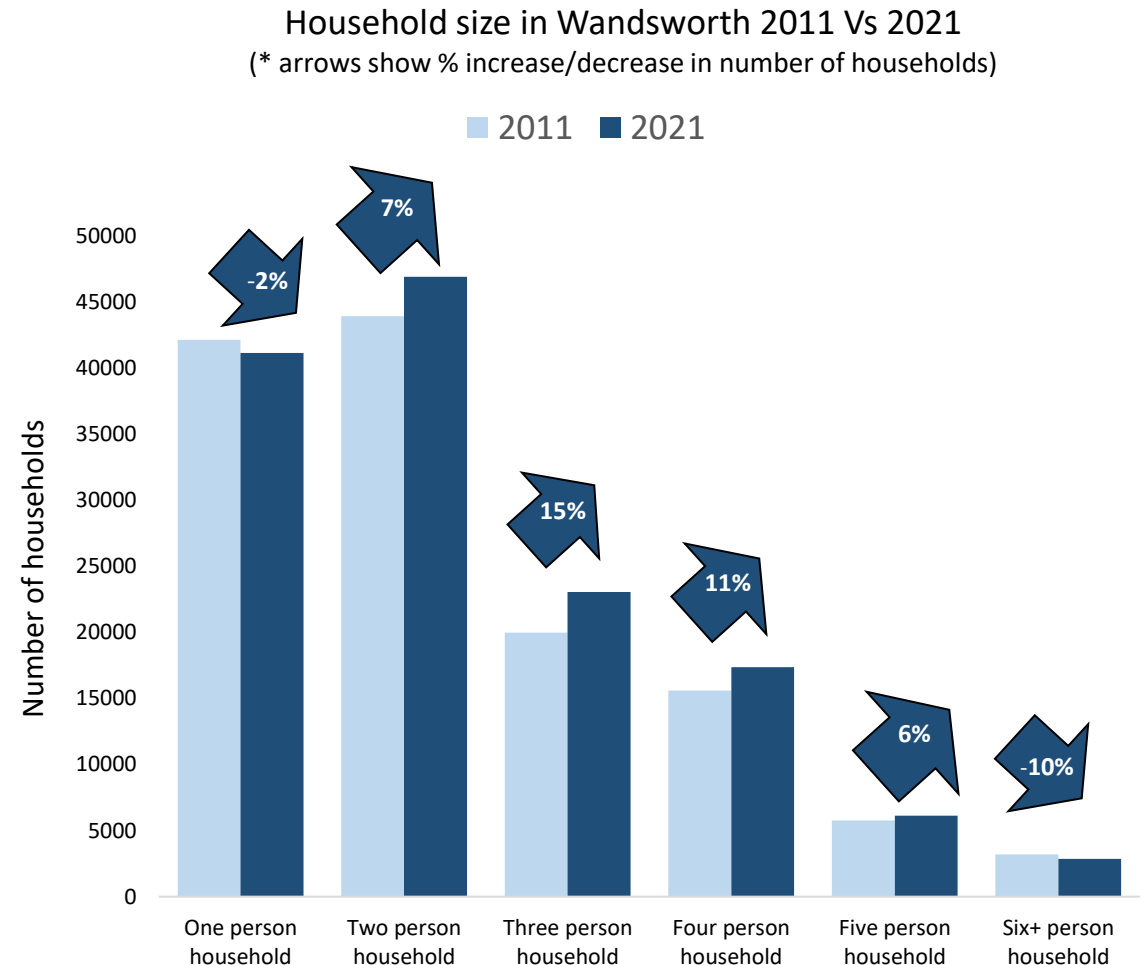
- [Avg. household size is 2.4](#), similar to 2011 and less than London (2.5)
- Almost [30% households are one person](#) households (people living alone). This is -2.4% lower than 2011 and similar to London. London wide decrease in people living alone; possibly due to older age of residents and housing costs in London.
 - Around [8% of Wandsworth households are those 66 years or older living alone](#)
- Around 6% of the households are lone parent households with dependent children. Higher in north of Roehampton, north of West Hill and Falconbrook
- Given the younger age profile, more than half the borough has never married/registered civil partnership. There are over 2,200 same-sex married/civil partnerships couples. [2021 Census is first time data is available on same sex couples](#).
- On the [ONS's deprivation measures](#), [Wandsworth is the 3rd least deprived borough in London](#). That said, in some areas of the borough almost a quarter of the households were deprived on 2 or more of the 4 measures of deprivation used.

Household size – Borough change

- Avg. household size locally is **2.4**, same as 2011, similar to Inner London but lower than London (2.5).
- Locally, most households are small. One person and two-person households make up 64% of Wandsworth households.
- 29.9% of households in Wandsworth are one person households (London 29.3%, England 30.1%).
- Since 2011, there has been a decline in very large (6+) and one person households. Decrease in one person households also seen in Inner London and London.
- Decrease in 6+ person households is possibly due to decline in shared living.

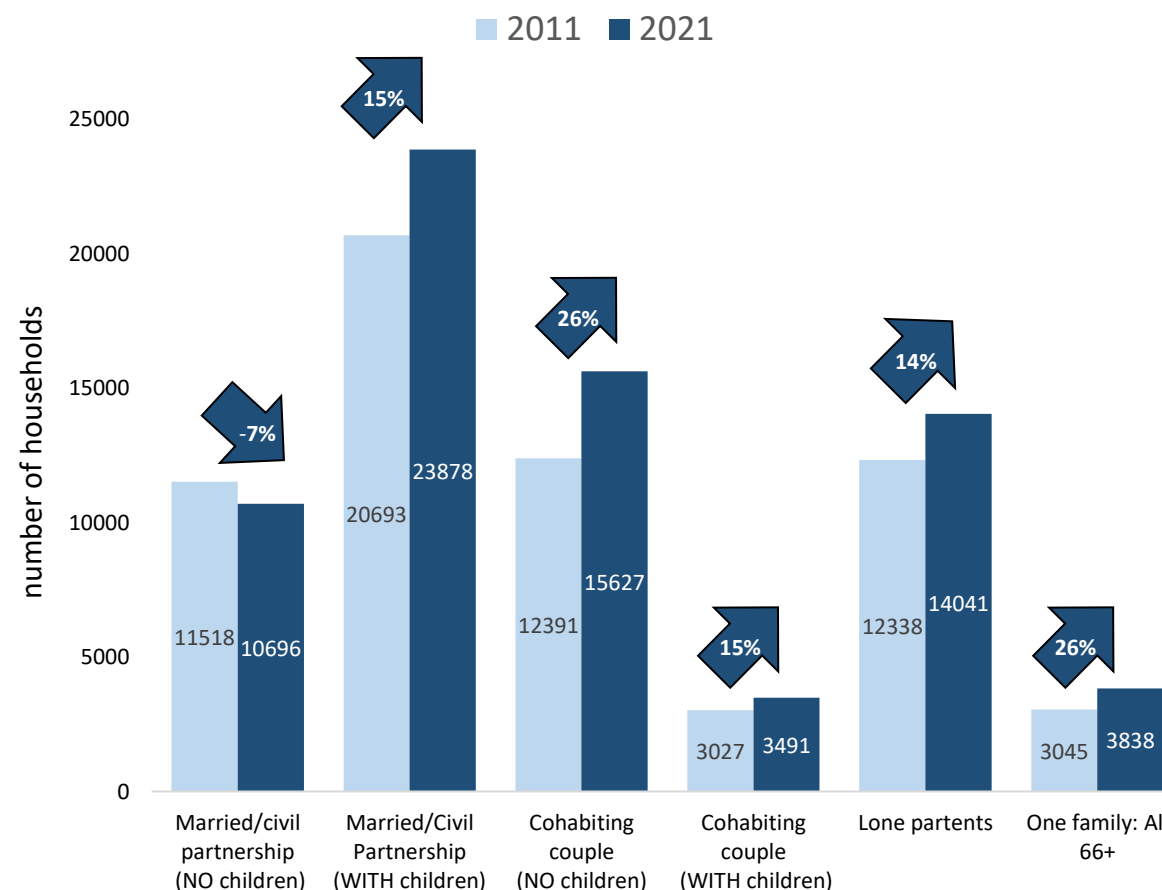


Structure of One Family households

- Locally, 54% of households are made-up of one family i.e., multiple related people living together (30% households are one person household, 16% other types of cohabiting)
- Largest family type in Wandsworth is couples without children (22%), which continued to increase from 2011 with the main increase coming from couples that are co-habiting. Conversely the percentage of households including a couple but no children decreased across England.
- Lone parent** households in Wandsworth (10%) have increased by +0.5% points since 2011. Among lone parent families, over half had dependent children. The proportion of **Lone parent** households is smaller in Wandsworth (10%) than Inner London (13%), London (13%) and England (11%).
- Lone parent families with dependent children were higher in north of Roehampton, north of West Hill and Falconbrook.
- Older families (all in household 66+ years) has seen sharpest increase, as would be expected due to ageing population.

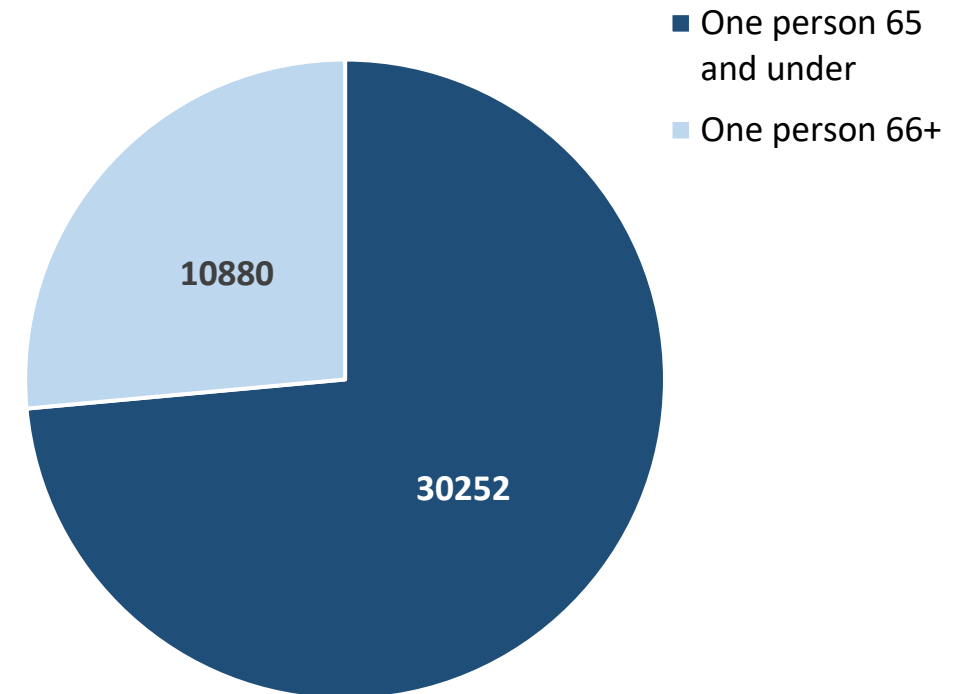
Wandsworth one family households 2011 Vs 2021

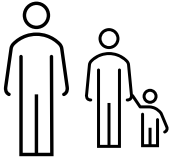
People Living Alone

- In Wandsworth 41,132 (29.9%) are one person households i.e., people living alone. This is lower than Inner London (34.3%) and similar to London (29.3%) and England (30.1%).
- 1 in 4 one person households (26%) are made up of a person who is 66+ years old.
- The proportion of 66+ living alone (8%) has not changed since 2011 and is the same as Inner London, but lower than London (9%) and England (13%).
- Older residents living alone (66+) are spread across the borough. One area of higher concentration is around **Battersea Park**

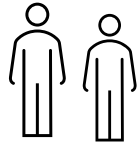
One person households in Wandsworth in 2021



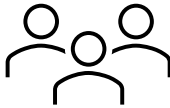

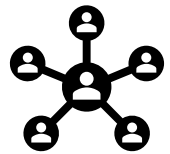
Around 1 in 3 households in Wandsworth have at least one child.



Wandsworth has the 2nd highest proportion of **2 person households (couples)** in London (behind the City of London). Likely due to large number of younger adults and couples living together without children.



13.5% of the households are 'other household types', this includes students, flat shares etc. made up of unrelated adults. Wandsworth proportion for this type of living arrangement is second highest in London.



In 2021, there were 4,508 (1.4%) **communal establishments*** residents in Wandsworth. The number of those living in communal establishments has gone down since 2011 when it was 5,347 (1.7%) of households. In 2021, the proportion of communal residents in Wandsworth is lower than Inner London (1.6%) but higher than London (1.1%). Half (51%) of communal establishment residents were in education establishments such as halls of residence. 27% lived in medical or care establishments which includes care homes ; and 17 lived in prison service establishments which was a decrease of -34% from 2011. Wandsworth has HMP prison located in Wandsworth Common ward.

** Communal establishment is an establishment providing managed (full or part-time supervision) residential accommodation. Establishments include medical or care; educational, armed forces, detention, religious establishments, as well as travel/temporary accommodation, hotel, guest houses, B&Bs, inns and pubs with residential accommodation. They exclude all sheltered accommodation, serviced apartments, houses rented to students by private landlords and nurses accommodation.*

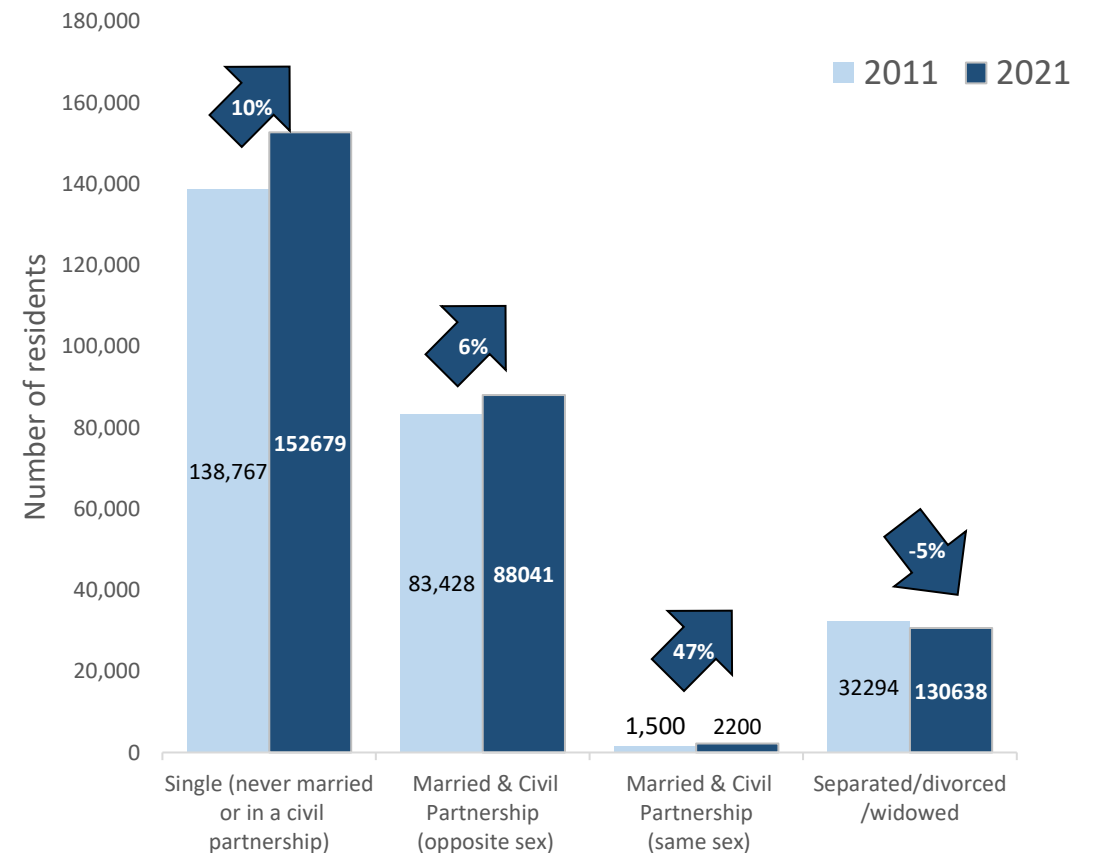
Marriage and Civil Partnerships

- **Over half of the borough has never married (56%)** (i.e., has never been married or in a civil partnership) which is the same proportion as Inner London, but higher proportions than London (46%) and England (38%). The proportion of people who are co-habiting without getting married has increased across England and Wales.
- People in England and Wales are generally getting married at an older age 34.3 years for men and 32.3 years for Women and as the borough has one of the youngest median ages in London this could explain the lower marriage rate.
- A third of the borough is married or in civil partnership.
- **Same sex couples who are married** has increased by 47%, which is likely due to the legalisation of same sex marriages in 2014. This increase is lower than for London (54%) and England (90%).

Marital Status of individuals in Wandsworth 2011 Vs 2021

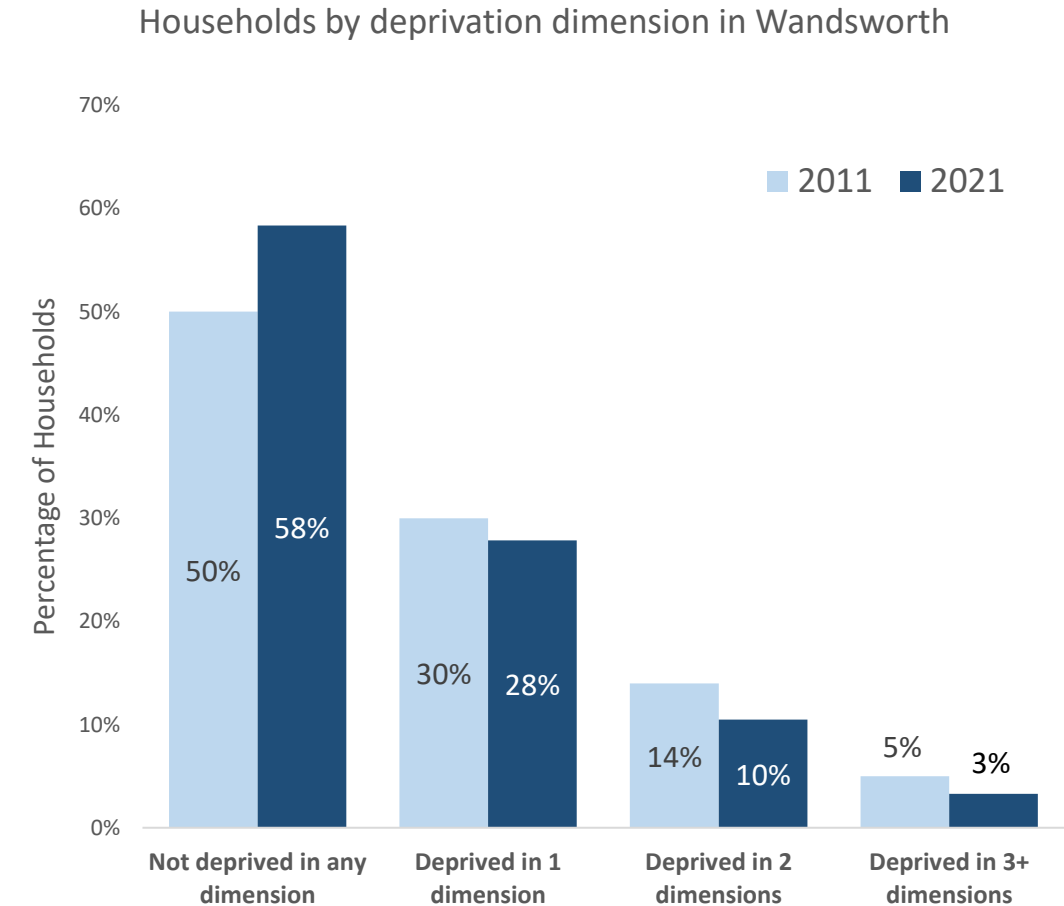

Household Deprivation – Borough level overview

- Census define deprivation based on 4 dimensions - employment, education, health and disability and housing. This differs from Index of Multiple Deprivation produced for DLUHC.
- The proportion of not deprived households is 10% points higher in Wandsworth (58%) than Inner London, London and England (48%). This may be partly due to the younger highly educated and employed population of the borough.
- Deprivation on ONS measure has decreased in Inner London, London and England since 2011.
- Local wards with the highest average ONS deprivation score align with the 2019 Indices of Deprivation (IMD) and are Roehampton, Falconbrook, Furzedown, Shaftsbury & Queenstown and Tooting Broadway.
- Wards with lowest ONS deprivation score were Northcote, Nine Elms, Thamesfield and Lavender.



Migration

Place of Birth, Passport and Time in UK

Data released 2 November 2022

Summary – Migration

- European migration to Wandsworth, London and England has increased since 2011 Census.
- More than **1 in 3 local residents were born outside** the UK.
 - 42% of non-UK born residents were from European countries
 - Top non-UK places of birth have changed since 2011. Top 3 in 2021 were South America, Italy and Pakistan. There was decrease in those born in South Africa, Poland and France.
- Almost **3 in 4 local residents hold a UK passport**. 13% of residents held EU passports (excluding Ireland)
- Almost 46% of non-UK born residents had arrived in UK in the last 10 years
- **7 in 10 non-UK born resident were 18-44 years** when they arrived in the country. Very few were older adults. Likely due to migration for work and studies being the predominant reasons for work.
- Despite COVID restrictions, 1 in 5 Wandsworth residents had moved in the year preceding the Census.



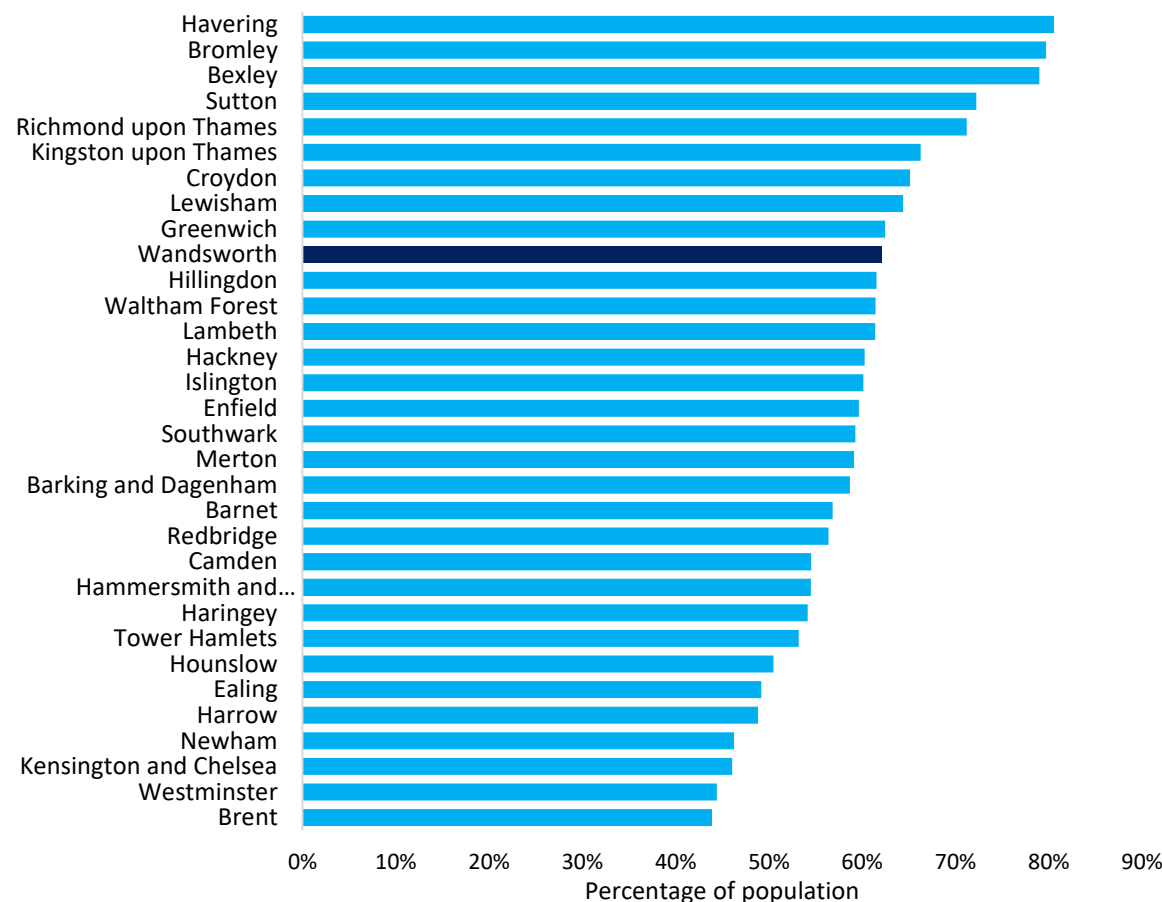
Residents Born in UK

- In 2021, 62% (203,322) of residents in Wandsworth were born in the UK compared to 65% in 2011. The proportion of non-UK born residents increased to 38% (124,184) since 2011.
- Compared to Inner London and London, Wandsworth had a lower proportion of residents born outside the UK.

Percentage of residents born in the UK, 2021

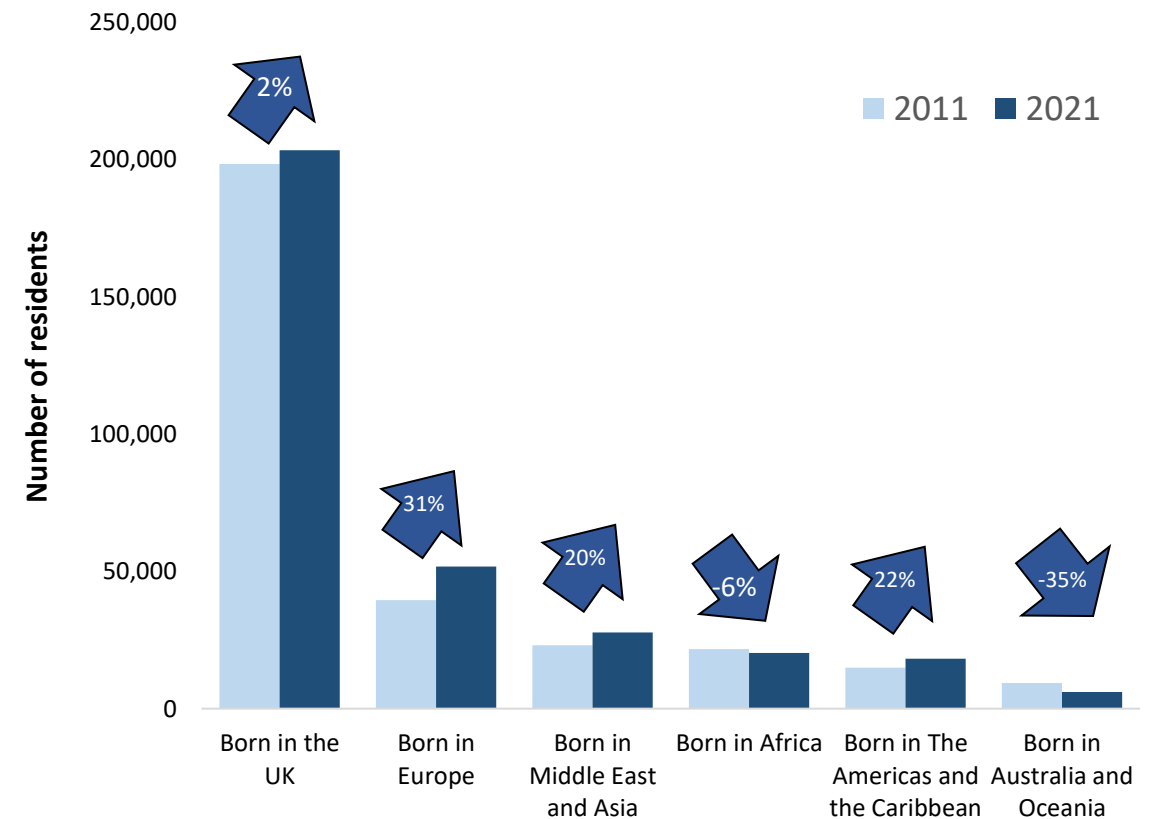


Place of birth – Change since 2011

- Compared to 2011, the overall number of residents born outside the UK increased by 14.4% from 108,573 to 124,184 residents; this was faster than overall population increase
- Highest proportion of non-UK born population lived in Nine Elms (56%), Battersea Park (47%), West Hill (45%) and Falconbrook (45%)
- 51,732 (15.8% of the borough population, 41.7% of non-UK born population) residents were born in Europe (EU and non EU); this was 12,188 more compared to 2011 and an increase of 30.8%. 85.7% of European residents are from EU countries
- Proportion of residents born in Europe was highest in Nine Elms (25%), Battersea Park (22%), St. Mary’s (21%) and Roehampton (19%)
- Compared to 2011, the borough saw a decline in those born in Africa and those born in Australia/New Zealand
- These trends are broadly in line with London

(* arrows show increase/decrease in number of births)



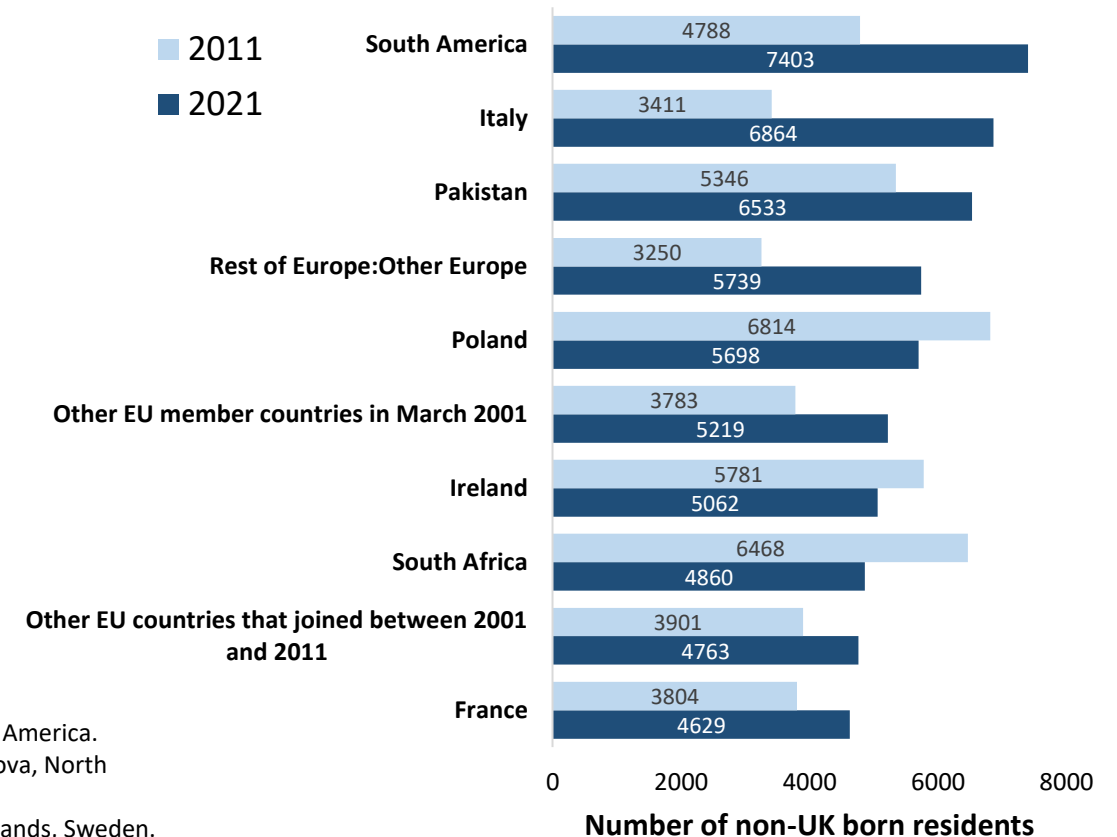
Top 10 Non-UK Places of birth

- The place of birth for non-UK born Wandsworth residents is changing and differs from London.
- In 2021, the top 3 non-UK places of birth locally were **South America***, **Italy** and **Pakistan** and numbers of residents born in each place increased compared to 2011.
- Compared to 2011 there was an increase of 2,615 (+54.6%) residents born in South America making it the top birth place for local residents. Wandsworth also saw the number of residents born in Italy double since 2011.
- There was a **decline in the numbers of residents born in Poland** (-16.4%), **Ireland** (-12.4%) and **South Africa** (-24.9%). In 2011, these were the top 3 places of birth in Wandsworth.
- Top 3 non-UK places of birth in London differ from Wandsworth. In London top three were India, Romania and non-EU European countries.
- Similar to Wandsworth, London saw a decrease in number of residents born in Poland and Ireland and an increase in number of residents born in South America and Italy

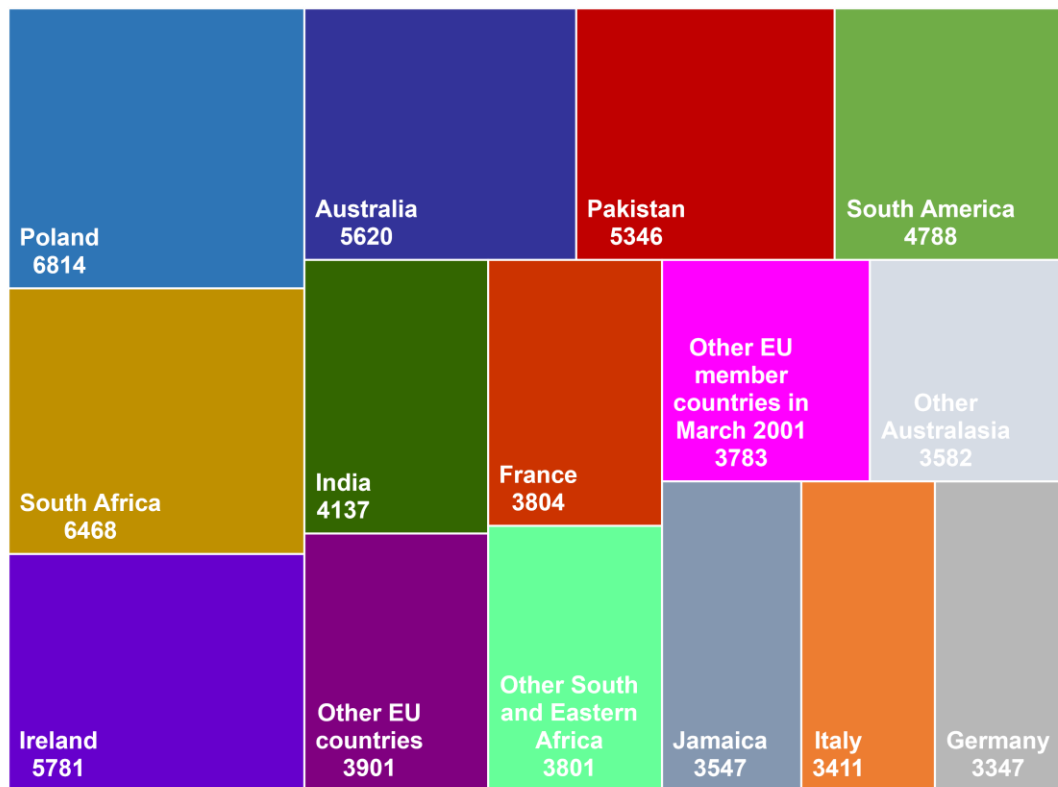
- South America includes Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Ecudaor, Guyana, Peru, Venezuela and other South America.
- Other Europe (non EU) include: Albania, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Georgia, Iceland, Kosovo, Moldova, North Macedonia, Norway, Russia, Serbia, Switzerland, Turkey and Ukraine.
- Other EU member countries in March 2001 include Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, Greece, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Sweden.
- Other EU member countries joined between 2001 and 2011 include Bulgaria, Czechia, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Slovakia and Slovenia.

Top 10 non-UK places of birth in 2021, with comparison to 2011

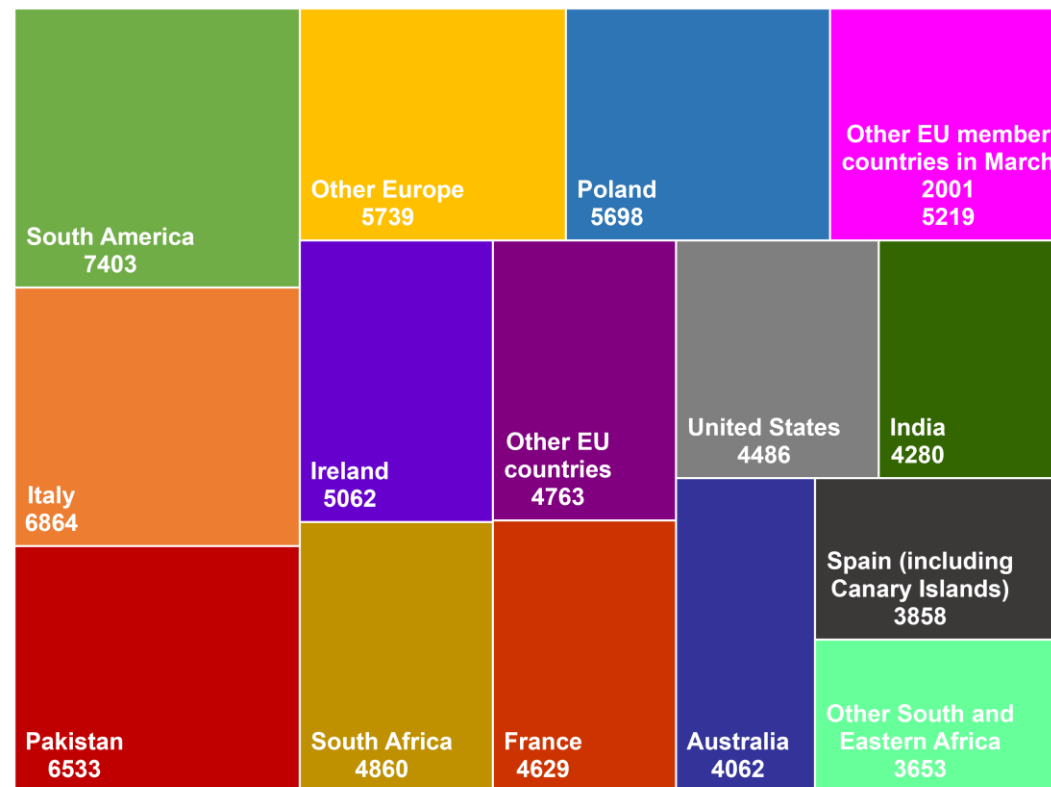


Non-UK place of birth –change over time

2021 CENSUS



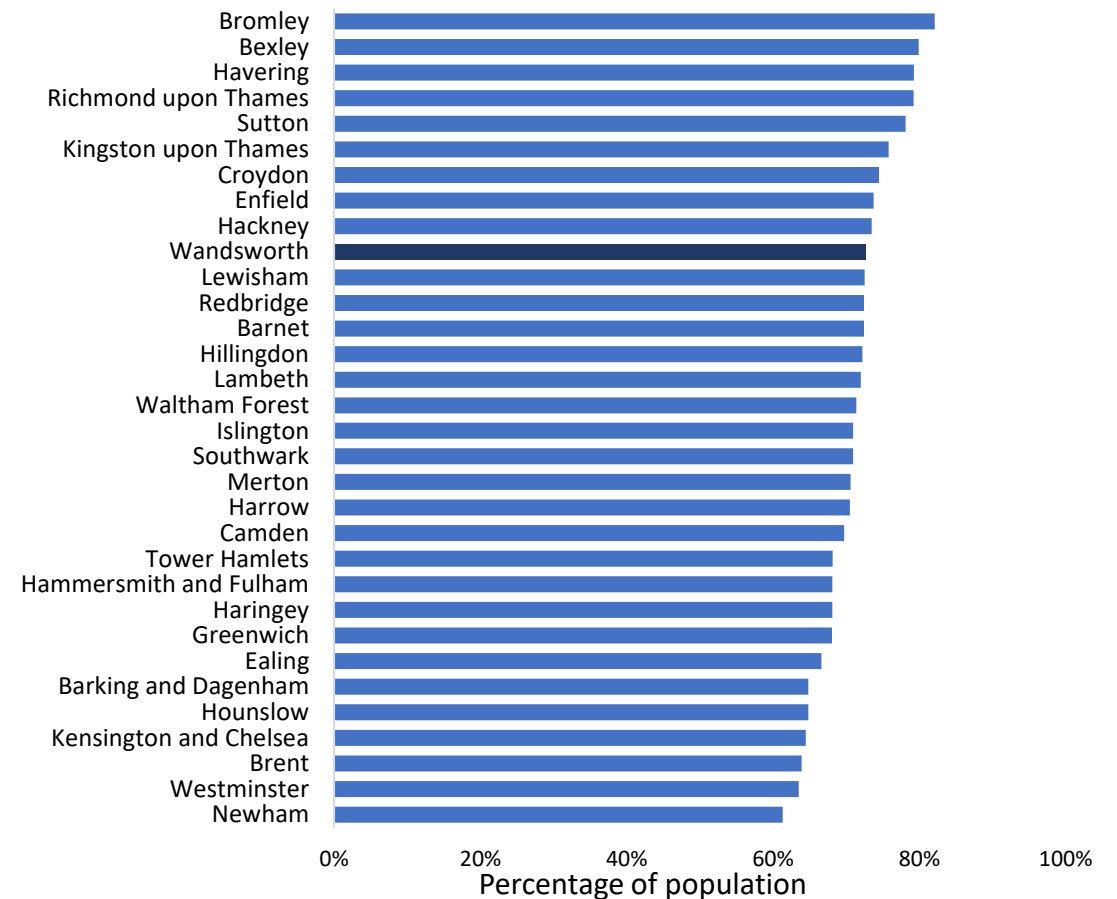

Passport Held

- 237,835 (73% of total) of Wandsworth residents were UK passport holders in 2021
- Proportion of UK passport holders in the borough was higher than Inner London and London.
- In 2011, there were 82,073 (26.7%) non-UK passport holders in Wandsworth. This figure decreased to 76,202 (23%) in 2021. **Most common non-UK passports held locally were those from other EU countries followed by Italy.** This was similar to the picture seen across England and Wales where those residents born in the EU are less likely to hold a UK passport, while those born in African countries are most likely to hold a UK passport.
- 23% of the borough residents held a non-UK passport which is a contrast to the 38% of the population born outside the UK, suggesting that a large proportion of residents who were born outside the UK have acquired British citizenship.
- 13.2% of Wandsworth residents held an EU passport* (excl. Ireland), making up 56.9% of all non-UK passport holders. This was similar to the London picture.

Year of arrival to the UK

- The Census asked usual residents the year they arrived in the UK (if they were born outside the UK) or whether they were born in the UK.
- Of the 124,184 residents not born in the UK, almost half, 56,828 (45.8%), arrived between 2011-2021.
- Compared to London and England, a higher percentage of non-UK born local residents arrived in the country within the last 10 years (Wandsworth = 45.8%, London = 41.0%; England = 42.4%)
- Residents born in the Middle East and Asia make up a larger proportion of those arriving into England and Wales in the last 3 years and reflects a large international student population.

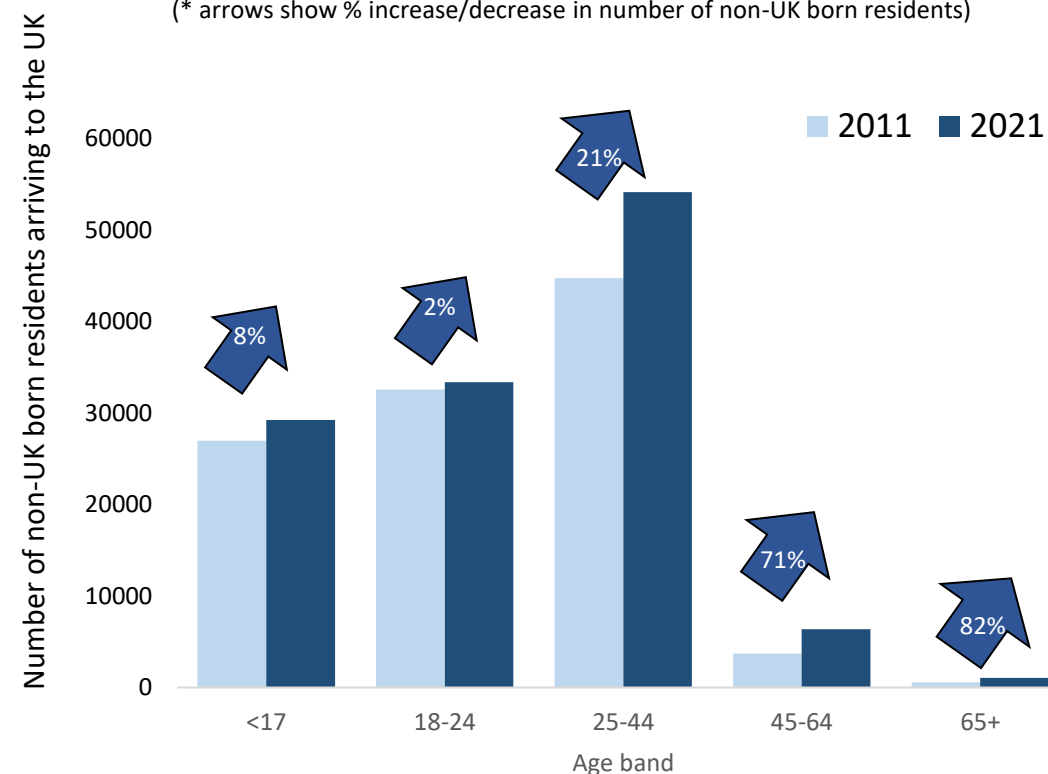
- 2021 Census showed that predominantly international arrivals to Wandsworth were young working adults.
- Of the 124,184 non-UK born residents in the borough, 7 out of 10 (87,489) were aged 18-44 when they arrived to live here. This was 10,208 more 18-44 year olds compared to what we saw in 2011.
- The pattern seen in age of arrival was similar across Wandsworth, Inner London and London. England saw a higher proportion of under 17 year olds arriving to the country but a lower proportion of 25-44 year olds.

Movement – 1 year preceding the Census

- The census asked respondents whether their **address** was the same as their address was **one year ago** (that is 21st March 2020)
- Even during the first year of the pandemic, **almost 1 in 5 Wandsworth residents had moved, one of the highest rates in London**
- Among London boroughs, Wandsworth had the highest percentage of residents moving in from elsewhere in UK.
- Fewer people were moving in from abroad probably as a result of travel restrictions imposed across the world due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This was similar to London and England.

**To provide best estimate of the population, ONS usually adjust census data for people who did not respond. For Census 2021, this adjustment happened for usual residents only as this is the main population base. Short-term residents were not adjusted, meaning data here do not include estimates of short-term residents who were living in the borough at the time of the census but did not respond to the census. As such, 2021 estimates are not directly comparable with the 2011 estimates of short term residents.*

Identity

Religion, ethnicity, national identity and language

Data released 29 November 2022

Summary – Identity

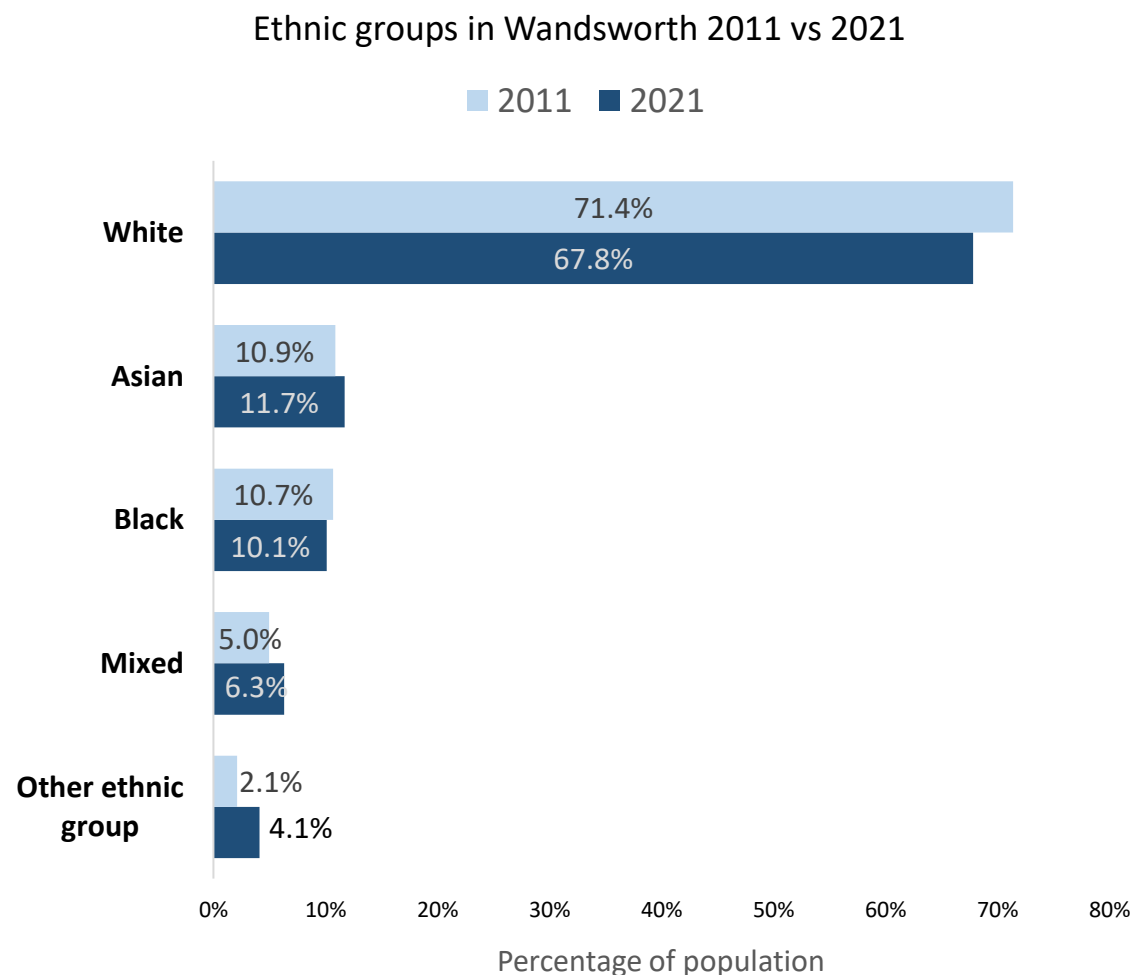
- Similar to London and England, Wandsworth is a more ethnically diverse borough since 2011. **Residents identifying as Black, Asian and Ethnic minority increased by +3.6% points to 32.2% (London 46.2%),** higher than was projected.
- **One in three residents (36.2%) identified as having no religion** (London 21.7%, England 36.7%). This increase was also seen across London and England. Muslims are about 1 in 10 residents in 2021, +31% increase since 2011.
- Vast majority of residents can speak English or speak it well. Only **2.3% cannot speak English at all or not well.** In some pockets of the borough this can reach 10%.
- The **top 3 languages spoken in Wandsworth in 2021 after English are Spanish, Italian and Urdu.** Urdu was the only one of these languages that was in the top three in 2011, although Spanish and Italian were both in the top 10.
- There is also increased diversity within households:
 - **13.2% have multi ethnic couples, largest proportion among the Inner London boroughs**
 - 13.1% households where the main language differs between household members
 - 18.6% religious identity differs between occupants (two different religions or religion and no religion)

Ethnic Groups

- Overall the Black, Asian and ethnic minority population has increased by +3.6% points since 2011 to 32.2% (Inner London = 46.7%, London = 46.2%). Although the black population has reduced by -0.6% points.
- White ethnic group make up two thirds of local residents, with almost half aged between 18 and 39 years.
- Asian population is higher around Tooting, West Hill North, Roehampton and Furzedown. Almost 60% of Asian residents are under 40 years of age.
- Black population is higher around Falconbrook, Shaftesbury & Queenstown, Battersea Park and Furzedown.
- White ethnic group is higher in Northcote, Thamesfield, Lavender and Southfields

Ethnic Group Breakdown by age

- Locally, 45% of 0-17 year olds identified as ethnic minority group (All ages 32%).
- Among 0-17 years, two of the largest minority ethnic groups are Black (14%); with Black African having the highest proportion at 8%, and Mixed or multiple ethnic groups (14%) groups; with White and Asian having the highest proportion at 5%.
- Compared to 2011, there was a lower proportion of White ethnic groups across all ages in 2021 showing an rise in diversity across the borough.
- Residents identifying as white ethnic group are highest among those 18-39 years. This is likely due to young adults moving to Wandsworth from other parts of the country to start education or employment in the capital.
- Ethnic minority groups make up 28% of those aged 65+ years (Wandsworth overall 32%)
- As the population of the borough aged, the proportion of the population from Mixed ethnic groups declined from 14% of 0-17 year olds to 1% of 65+ year olds.
- In 45% of multiple-person households all household members identified with the same ethnic group. In 26% of households people from multiple ethnic groups were living together. Since 2011, there has been a 2% points increase in different ethnic groups in partnerships; 13% of households. *(Note: Around 30% of the households were a person living alone)*

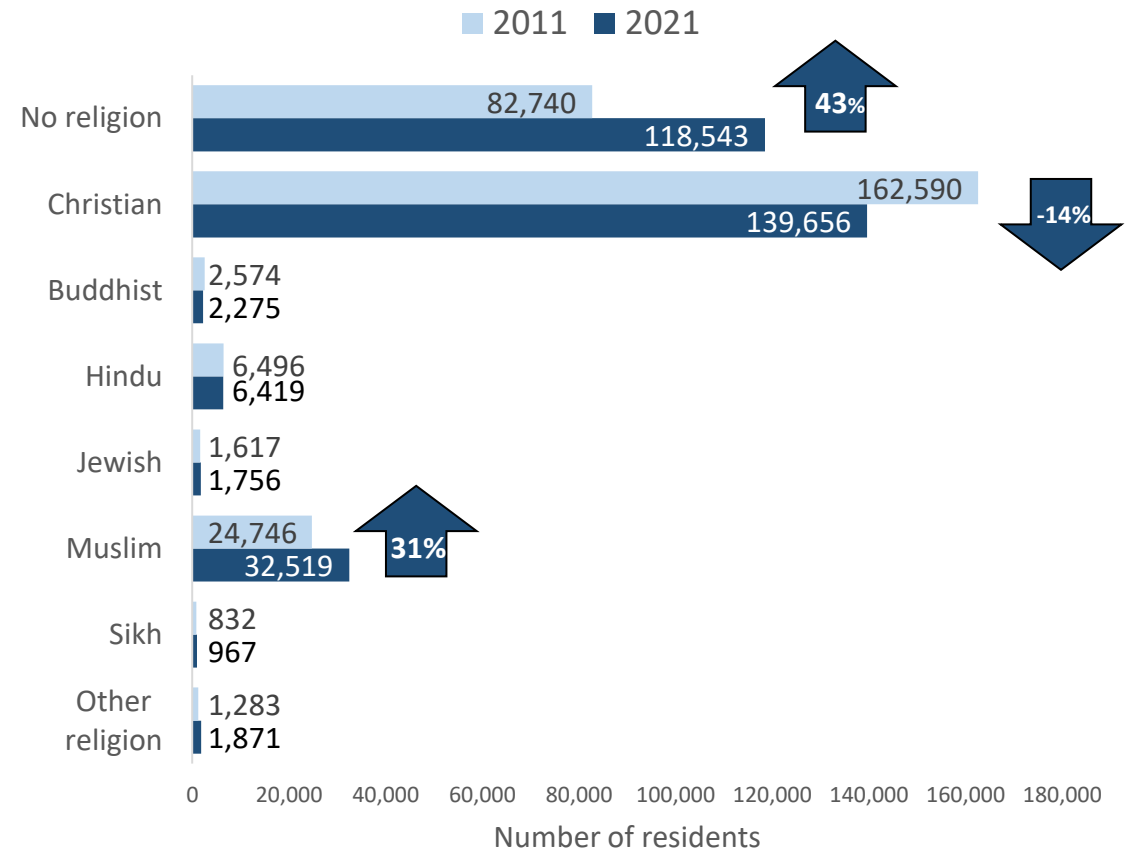

- **Less than half** (42.6%) the borough is **Christian**. It is still the largest religion in Wandsworth, but has reduced by -10.4% points since 2011 (53%). This proportion is higher than Inner London (38%) and London (40.7%), but lower than England (46.3%).
- **One in three** (36.2%) of the borough's residents reported **No Religion**, an increase of 9.2% points since 2011. This proportion is lower than Inner London (31.7%) and London (27.1%) and similar to England (36.7%).
- Islam is the second largest religion in the borough (9.9%) as it was in 2011 and the number of Muslim residents has increased by +31.4% since 2011. This increase is higher than Inner London (+20.8%) and London (+30.2%) and lower than England (+42.9%).
- Of those residents reporting to be Christian, 35% were aged under 29 years. Residents reporting to be Muslim, just over half were of younger adults aged under 29 years (52%) compared to the 30+ year old population (48%).

(* arrows show % increase/decrease in number of residents)



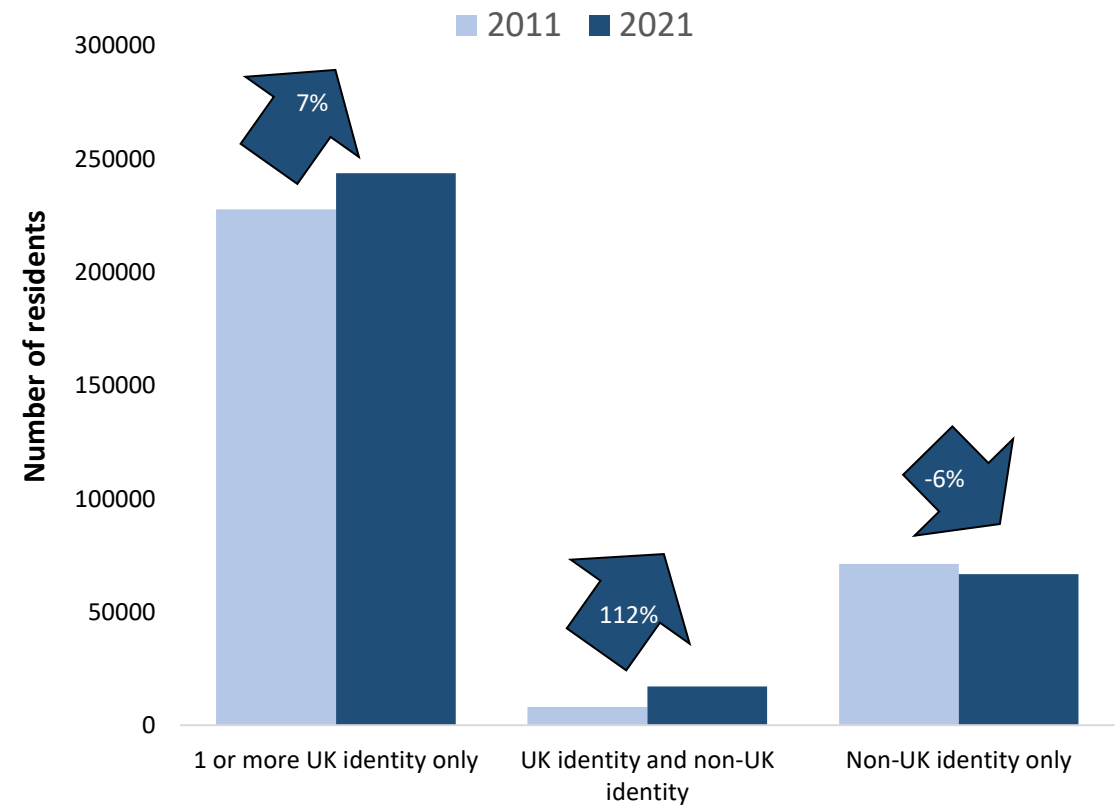

- The Census question on identity allowed respondents to select all identities that applied to them.
- In 2021, 243,700 Wandsworth residents identified with one or more UK identities (e.g. English, British). This was around 74.4% of the overall population, similar to 2011.
- The number of respondents who had a UK identity as well as a non-UK identity doubled in number compared to 2011.
- A similar pattern was seen across London
- Those selecting a non-UK identity only accounted for 20.4% of the overall population which was a decrease from 23.2% of the population in 2011. Almost 40% of those respondents with a non-UK identity only were living in Nine Elms.
- Among those borough residents who responded having a non-UK identity, the most common response was those describing “Italian” only as their identity.

(* arrows show % increase/decrease in number of households)

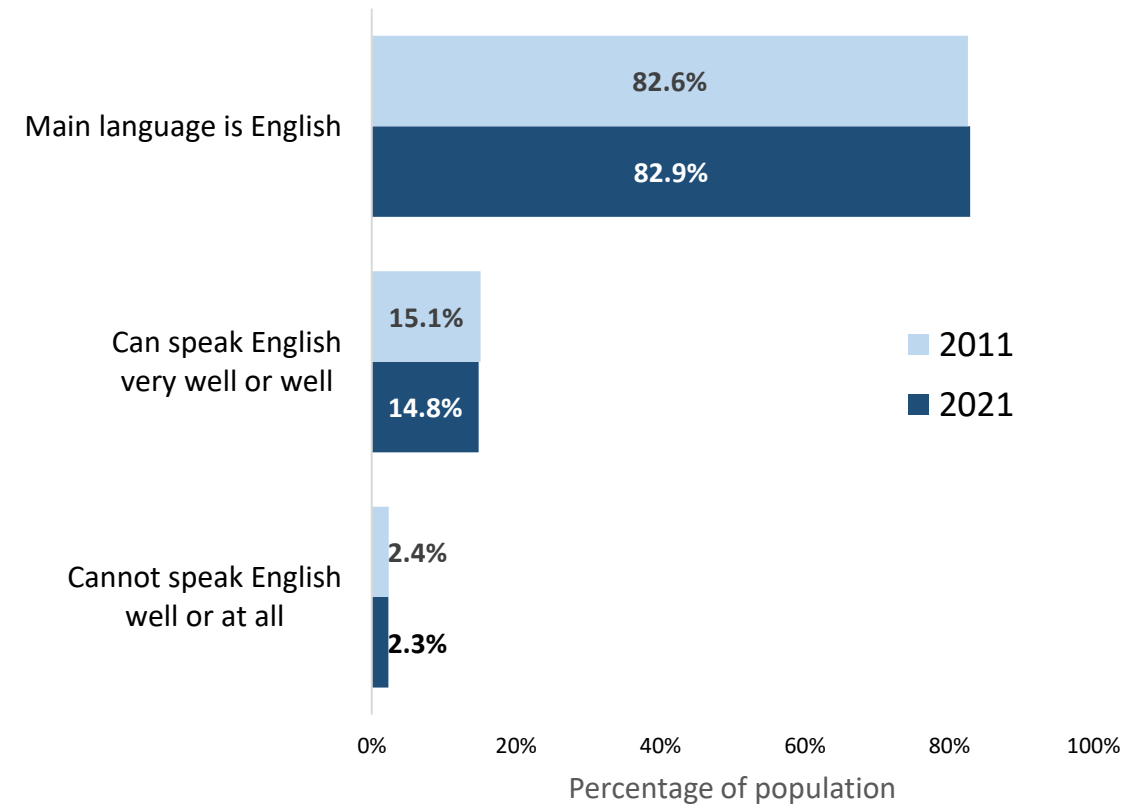


Proficiency in English

- Vast majority of residents are proficient in English. 83% have **English** as their main language and further 15% can speak English well.
- **7,325** residents **cannot speak English well or at all** (2.3%) an increase of 459 people since 2011 with the overall proportion remaining the same. Areas with the highest concentrations are around Roehampton South & Putney Vale (6.1%), Furzedown East (4.7%), Roehampton North (4.4%).
- The proportion of people who cannot speak English well or at all is lower in Wandsworth (2.3%) than it is in Inner London (4.3%), London (4.2%), but higher than England (1.9%).

Wandsworth residents ability to speak English 2011 Vs 2021

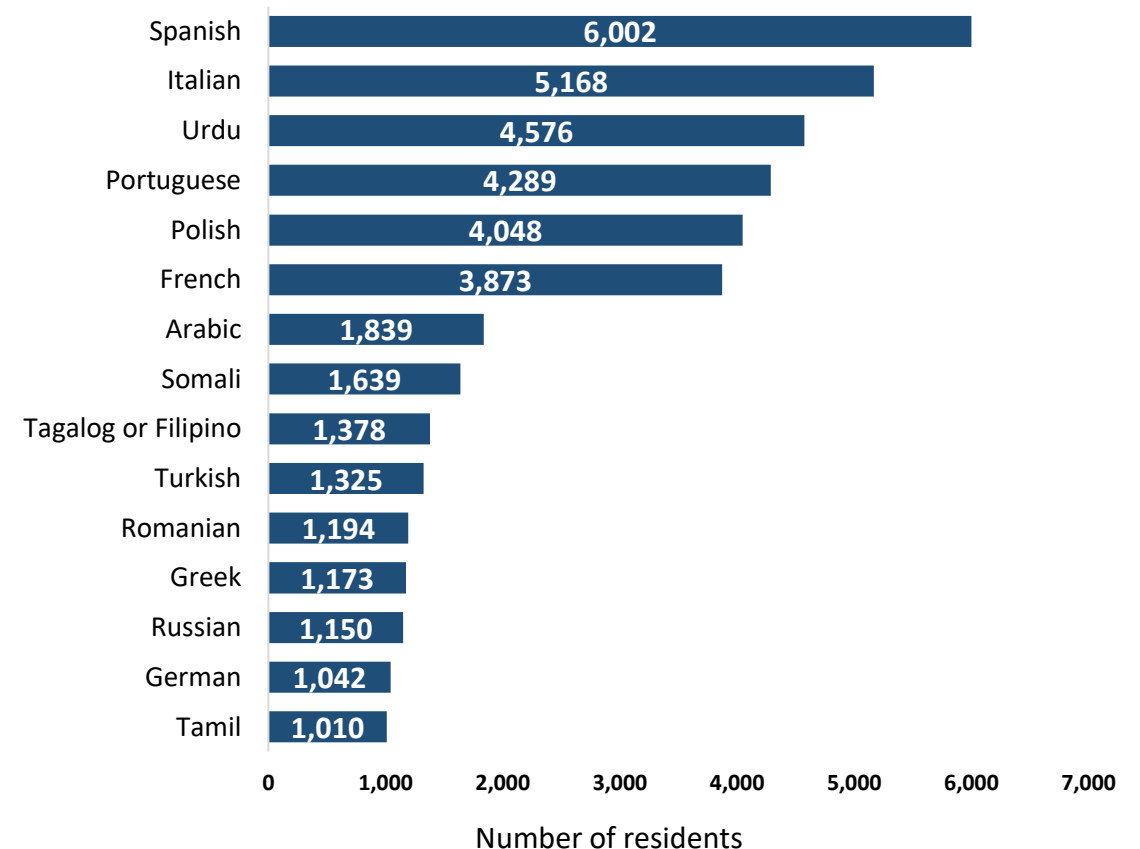


Main Language

- **English** is the main language of 83% Wandsworth residents, which is the same as it was in 2011. This is a higher proportion than Inner London (77.7%) and London (78.4%), but lower than England (90.8%).
- 13.1% household have members that **speak different main languages**.
- **Spanish** (1.9%) is now the most spoken language in Wandsworth after English rising from 4th highest (1.2%) in 2011, likely due to increase in migration from South America.
- In 2011, **Polish** was the most spoken language in Wandsworth after English and is now in 5th place.

Work and Employment

Economic activity, Travel to work, working hours, Industry and Occupation

Summary – Work and Employment

- The census took place during the coronavirus pandemic, a period of unparalleled and rapid change; the national lockdown, associated guidance and furlough measures will have affected the work and employment topic.
- **1 in 5 residents (20.3%) reported being in part-time employment.** This is an increase of +2.2% points since 2011. There has been an increase in part-time working in most boroughs, which could indicate that this trend has been influenced by Covid.
- Almost 1 in 4 of the residents (23.6%) who were in full time employment worked 49 or more hours per week, although working longer hours has reduced by -3.3% points since 2011.
- Of those residents not in employment **Wandsworth has the lowest proportion of residents that have never worked (30.1%)** in Inner London (excluding City of London), which is lower than London (35.2%) and higher than England (25.6%).
- During COVID the CJRS (Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme) provided support for paying wages of staff on furlough until the scheme closed on 30th September 2021. By this time the CJRS was supporting 410,000 employers who had a total of 1.16 million jobs on furlough. Wandsworth had 57,300 employees that were supported by the CJRS over the duration of the scheme. On average, the majority of those furloughed were employments earning under £25,000 and mainly fell within the accommodation and food services sector, professional, scientific and technical sector as well as admin and support services sector
- The proportion of Wandsworth residents working from home (56.5%) was the 4th highest in London (excluding city of London). Although national lockdown was in place on census day, this indicates that **more Wandsworth residents have the ability to work from home** compared to other London boroughs. The areas with higher proportions of residents WFH were Clapham Common West, Nightingale Lane and Balham.
- Of those still travelling to work the largest proportion (36%) travelled between 5km and 10km.
- Almost 1 in 2 households (48%) in Wandsworth **do not have access to a car or van.** This is the 2nd lowest proportion in Inner London. The number of households without access to a car/van has increased by +11.2% since 2011. Households without access to a car/van is the highest around Nine Elms, Queenstown Road & Patmore and York Gardens.
- The Census asked respondents aged 16+ if they had previously served in the UK armed forces (even if they served for at least 1 day they were classed as a veteran). 4137 (1.5%) of Wandsworth residents had served in the armed forces; this was lower than England (3.8%) , higher than London (1.4%) and Inner London (1.1%).

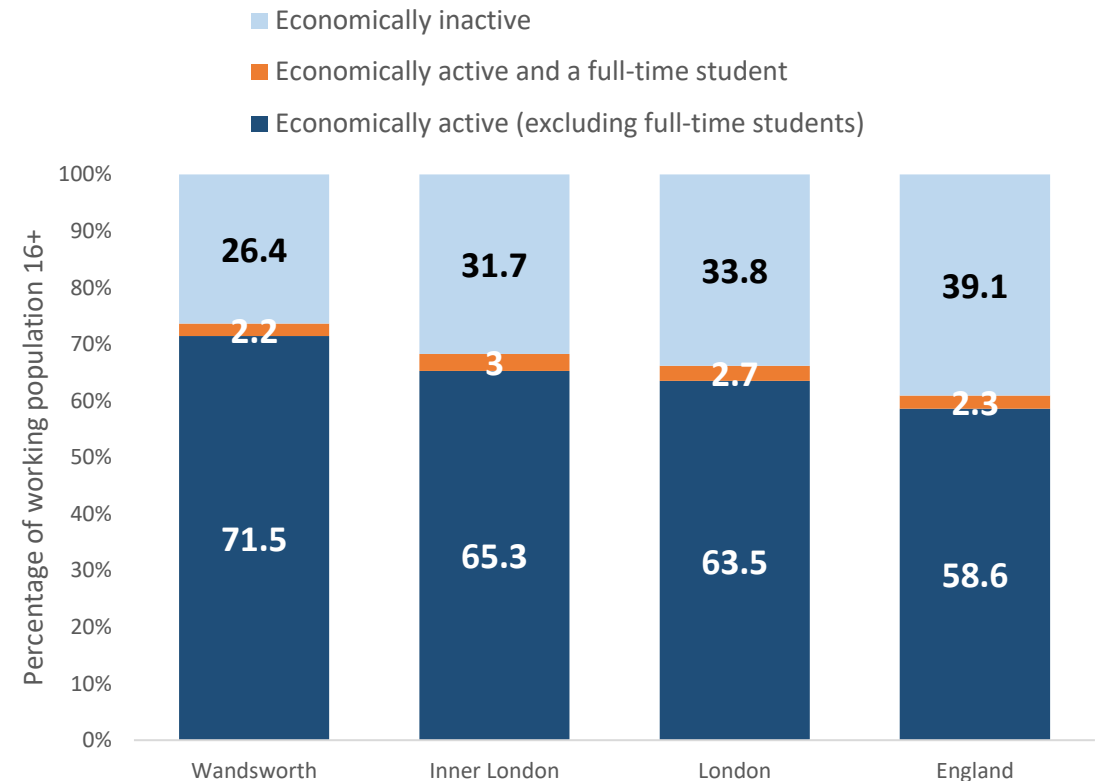

- Almost 3 in 4 (73.7%) residents over the age of 16 are economically active.
- Wandsworth has the lowest level of Economic inactivity (26.4%) in London, which is up +4.3% points since 2011, and is below England (39.1%). Of those inactive 10% were retired and 6% were students not working, 4.6% were looking after home and family and 2.7% were long-term sick or disabled
- The ONS Annual Population Survey (APS) for all residents 16+ reports lower levels of inactivity (23.4%) due to differences in reporting. As per the APS Economic Inactivity in Wandsworth has reduced by around -2% points in the last 10 years.
- Among the 26% economically inactive, 10% were retired and 6% were students not working, 4.6% were looking after home and family and 2.7% were long-term sick or disabled.
- Economic Inactivity (excluding students and the retired) is highest in Roehampton, York Gardens, and West Hill North.

- Compared to 2011 there was an increase of almost +7% in the number of Wandsworth's working population in employment. The number of retired residents almost doubled compared to 2011.
- Just over 1 in 2 of Wandsworth's working population work in 'Professional' occupations (32.5%) or Associate professional and technical occupations (19.6%).
- The number of residents working in elementary occupations (5.3%) has decreased by -5.1% since 2011.
- Top industries/business of employment, making up 65% of the total industry:
 1. Professional, scientific and technical activities (15.5%)
 2. Human health and social work activities (12.1%)
 3. Wholesale and retail trade; repair of motor vehicles and motorcycles (9.9%)
 4. Financial and insurance activities (9.9%)
 5. Information and communication (9.4%)
 6. Education (8.5%)
- The largest proportional increase is within the Human health and social work activities Industry.

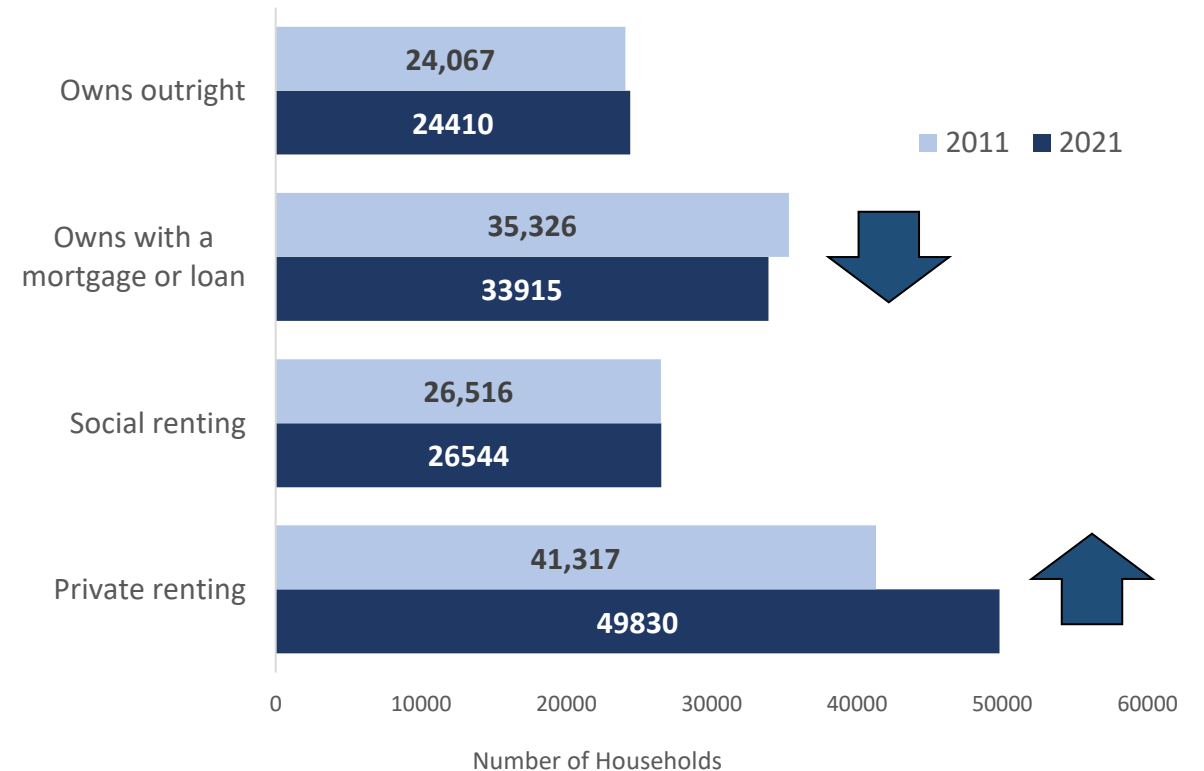

- Households who own their home outright (17.8%) is the 2nd highest in Inner London (excluding city of London). Higher than Inner London (13.8%) and lower than London (20.7%) and England (32.5%).
- 1 in 4** households **owned with a mortgage** (24.7%) is higher than Inner London (18.1%), similar to London (24.5%) and lower than England (28.8%). The number of households has **gone down by -4% since 2011**.
- 50+ age group make up 78% of those households owned outright and 35-64 year olds make up 72% of those who own with a mortgage, with the White ethnic group followed by Asian ethnic groups being most likely to own their property.
- 1 in 3** households being **privately rented** (36.3%) is higher than Inner London (34.6%), London (29.9%) and England (20.4%). The number of private renters has increased by +20% since 2011 and this trend is the same for all but two London boroughs.
- Almost half of private rented properties were occupied by 25-34 year olds, with this being the largest housing type for the Other ethnic group and mixed ethnic groups.
- Households which are social renting (19.3%) is the lowest proportion in Inner London (excluding city of London). Lower than Inner London (31.6%) and London (23.1%) and higher than England (17.1%).
- Social renters are most likely to be within the 50-64 age group, and the Black ethnic population in the borough are more likely to be social renters.
- There are a further 2,509 (1.8%) households that are in shared ownership and 184 (0.1%) households living rent free.

2011 Vs 2021



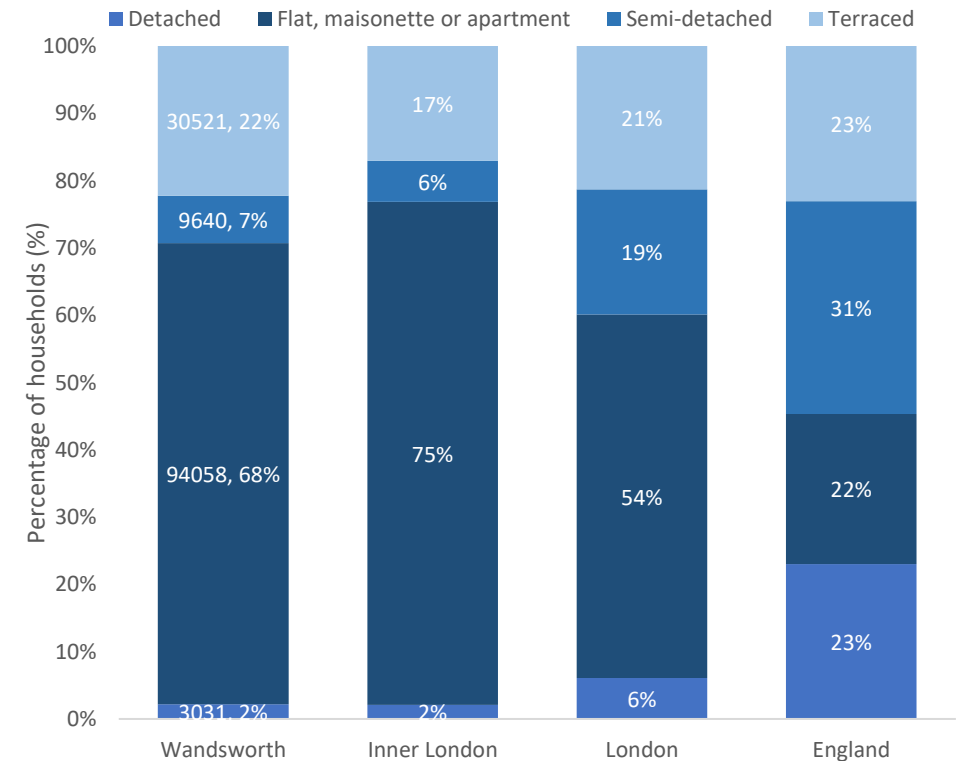
Housing type and Second Address

- Locally, in 2021, there were 137,393 households, in which 327,500 usual residents lived. Since 2011, the number of households increased by 5.3%.
- Over the last decade, Wandsworth saw an increase of purpose-built flats and flat conversions. There was a slight decrease of households in detached dwellings and terraced housing. The borough had a higher proportion of households in flats, maisonettes/apartments compared to London and England.
- The census asked about the number of bedrooms available in a household. The **most common was 2 bedroom households** (n=49,124) followed by 1 bedroom (n= 31,318). **The number of 4+ bedroom households increased by 20%** since 2011.
- 2.1% (n= 2,832) of households in Wandsworth had no central heating, higher than the England average (1.5%). The most common type of heating was gas with 7 in 10 households(n= 95,727) reported to use it, followed by electric heating (n= 18,295).
- 28,577 usual residents in Wandsworth reported having a second address. 5.6% (n=18,378) used a second address within the UK, while 3.1% (n=10,199) used a second address abroad*. 1.8% (n=6,057) said the purpose of their second address was a holiday home, while 2.7% (n=8,992) was another parent or guardian's address.

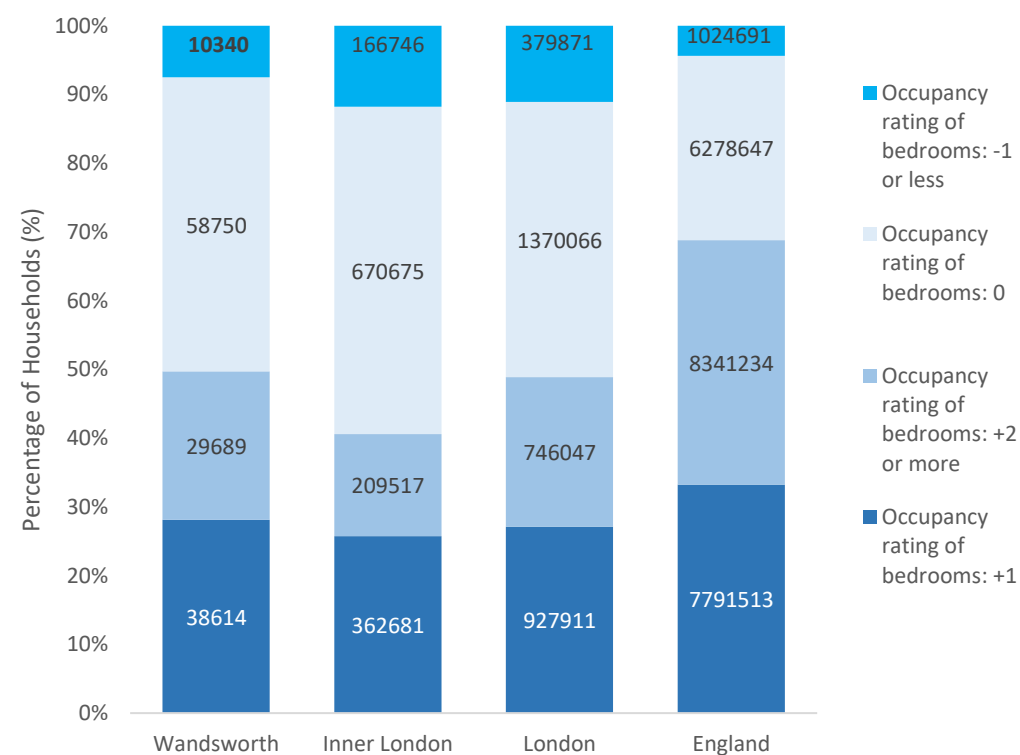

- Occupancy rating* provides a measure of whether a household's accommodation is overcrowded.
- Locally, 7.6% of households in Wandsworth (n=10,340) had fewer bedrooms than required, down from 9% in 2011. This proportion is lower than Inner London (12.3%), London (11%) but higher than England (4.3%).
- 42.8% of households in Wandsworth had the required number of bedrooms.
- Almost half of households in Wandsworth had more bedrooms than required; this was higher than London but lower than England.

- **First time Census has collected data on sexual orientation.** The question was voluntary and only asked of people aged 16+ (n= 273,558).
- **Locally, 14,148 (5.2%) of 16+ year olds were either gay/lesbian, bisexual or any other sexual orientation.** This was lower than Inner London (6.4%) and higher than England (3.2%) and London (4.3%).
- Locally, males were more likely to identify as LGB+ with the majority aged between 25-44 years (*higher proportion aged 24-34 years old*). In females, the majority of LGB+ were more likely to be aged between 16-34 years (*higher proportion aged 25-34 years old*).
- England wide analyses show that majority of LGB+ were aged 16-34. In England, highest proportion was among those 16-24 years (6.91%) and the proportion was lower among older age groups.
- In England, among 16-24 years olds, bisexual was the most common identity. Gay and Lesbian was higher than bisexual among older age groups.
- In England, females were more likely to identify as LBG+. Among 16-24 year old almost double the proportion of females identified as LBG+ compared to males (9.38% vs. 4.5%)

- **First time Census has collected data on gender identity.** The question was voluntary and only asked of people aged 16+ (n=273, 565).
- 254,037 (92.86%) said their gender identity was the same as their sex registered at birth, higher than London and England.
- In total, **1,691 (0.62%) Wandsworth residents indicated a change in gender identity** with 713 (0.26%) stating their gender identity was different to that of birth but did not provide a write in response to what they identified with.
- Of the 1,690 residents who indicated a change in gender identity, there was an even split between males and females. 3 in 5 were aged under 44 years of age.
- Locally, 347 identified as trans woman and 304 identified as trans man; the proportions were lower to that of London but higher than England.
- 182 Wandsworth residents identified as non-binary. This proportion of the population was lower than the London but higher than England averages.
- In England, 16-24 were most likely age group to have said their gender identity was different from their sex registered at birth and proportion declined in older age groups.

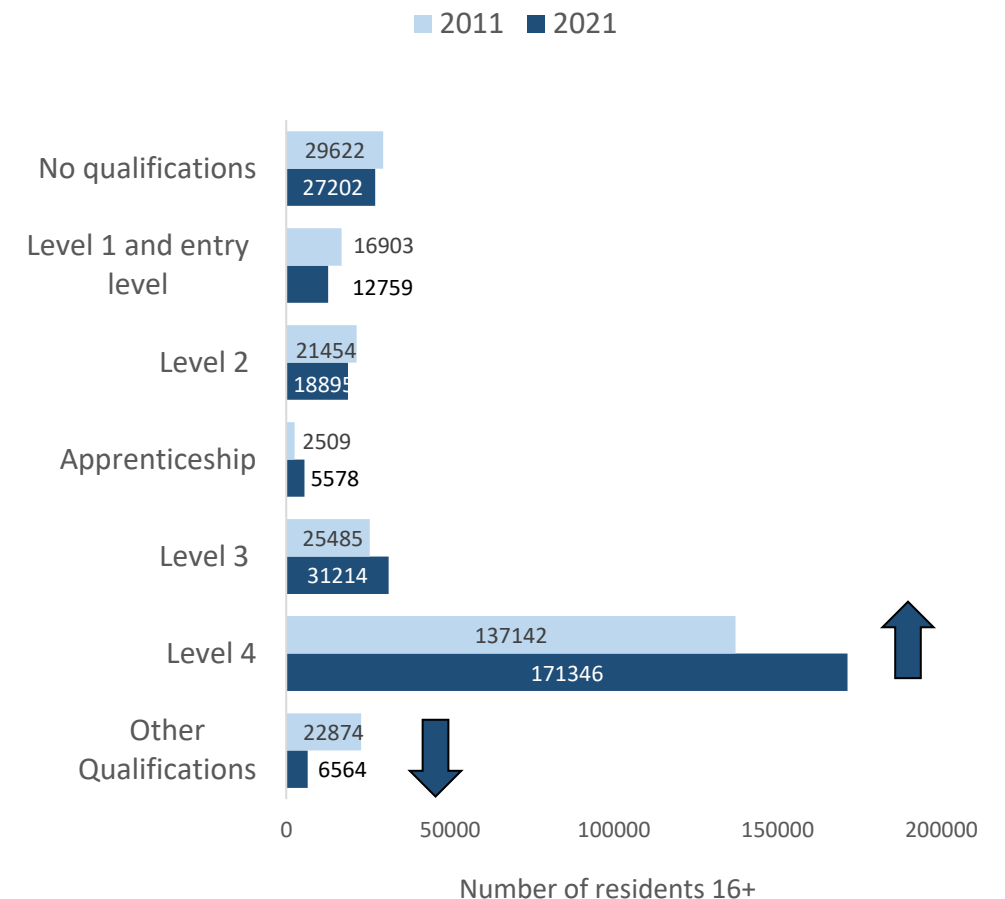

- **Wandsworth has the highest proportion of residents with level 4 or above qualifications (62.6%) in London** (excluding city of London), higher than Inner London (53.6%), London (46.7%) and England (33.9%).
- **27,202 (9.9%) residents without any qualifications**, the 2nd Lowest proportion of residents in London (excluding City of London) and lower than Inner London (14.5%), London (16.2%) and England (18.1%).
- Less apprenticeships locally (2%) than Inner London (2.5%), London (3.2%) and England (5.3%), but the number of apprenticeships has increased by +122% since 2011.
- Just under **1 in 5** residents (18.2%) in Wandsworth are in **full time education**.
- *Changes to the collection methodology mean that a proportion of respondents will have identified a different qualification level than they did in 2011 even though they still hold the same qualifications. Especially affects the other qualification category.*
- *Qualification categories:*
 - *Level 1: one to four GCSE passes (A* - C)*
 - *Level 2: five or more GCSE passes (A* - C)*
 - *Level 3: two or more A Levels or equivalent*
 - *Level 4 or above: Higher National Certificate, Higher National Diploma, Bachelor's degree, or post-graduate qualifications*

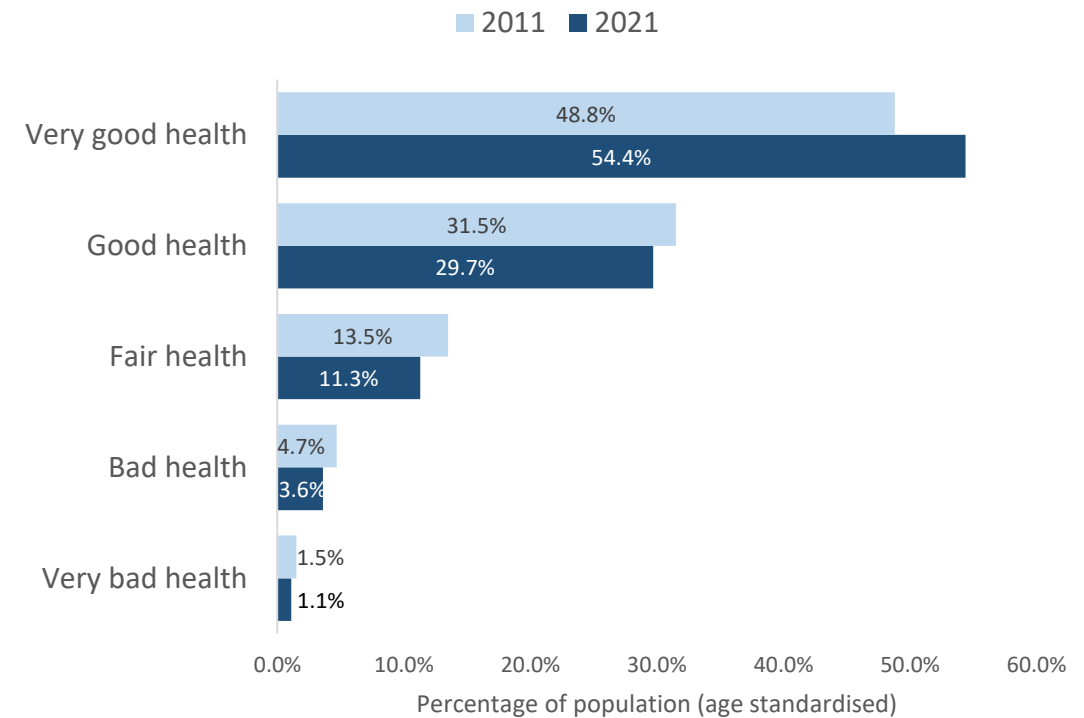

General Health

- As the census was conducted during COVID, this may have influenced how residents perceived and rated their health, therefore affecting how people responded.
- Just over 8 out of 10 residents (84.1%) in Wandsworth reported their health as 'good' or 'very good', which is the 5th highest proportion in London (excluding City of London).
- Wandsworth also had the lowest proportion of residents (4.7%) reporting 'bad' or 'very bad' health in Inner London (excluding City of London). Locally, females were more likely to report their health as being 'bad' or 'very bad'.
- In England, percentage of people with good or very good reported health declined with age and males and females reported similar level of good health.
- In England, across all age groups, people in higher deprivation areas were less likely to report good health.

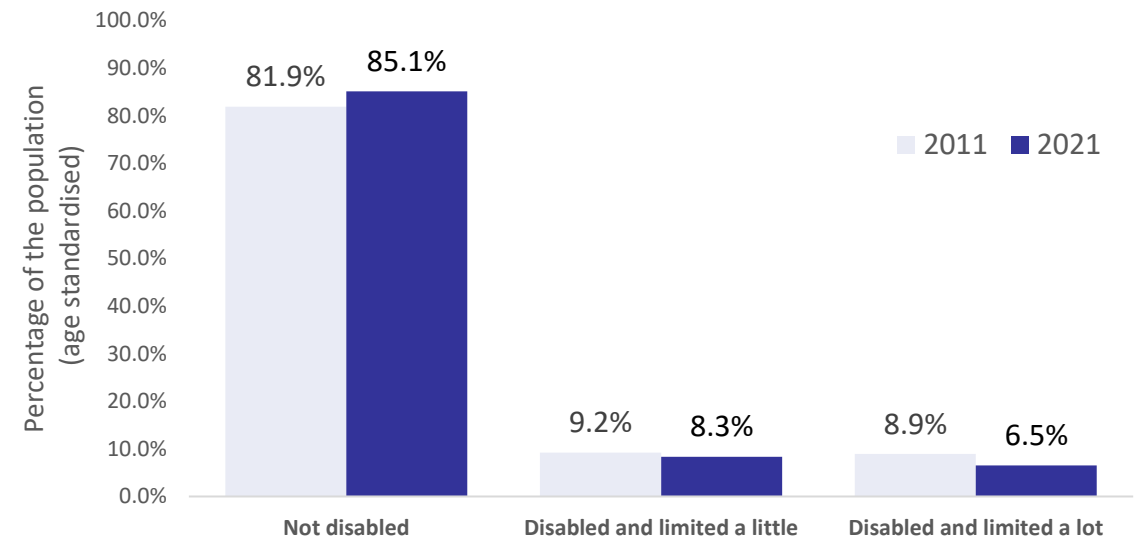

- 2021 and 2011 questions differed, questions changed to align with equalities legislation. Pandemic may have influenced how people perceived their health status and activity limitation.
- Proportion of residents **not disabled** (85.1%) increased by +3.2% points since 2011. Higher than London (84.3%) and England (82.3%).
- 37,444 (14.8%) residents have a disability that affects their day-to-day activities a little or a lot.
- 20,184 are not disabled but have a long term physical/mental health condition that does **NOT** affect their day-to-day activities.
- **Locally, 21.5% of households had 1 or more people with a reported disability.**

- "Do you have any physical or mental health conditions or illnesses lasting or expected to last 12 months or more?". If they answered yes, a further question
- "Do any of your conditions or illnesses reduce your ability to carry out day-to-day activities?" was presented.

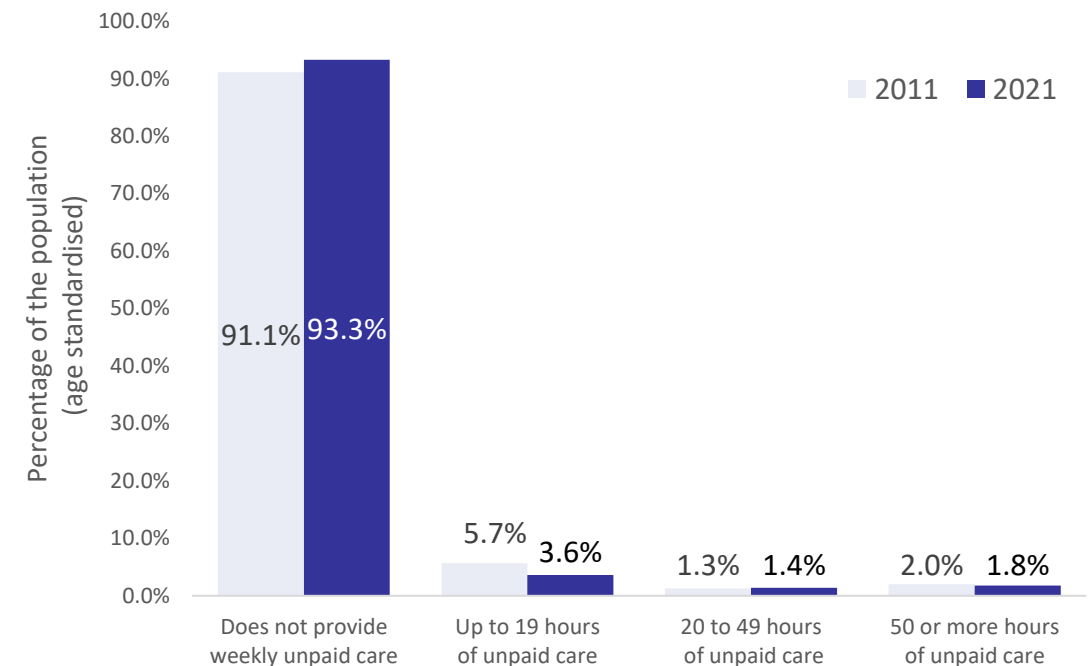
Unpaid care

- 17,705 (6.8%) of Wandsworth residents reported providing unpaid care, the lowest proportion in London (excluding City of London). Lower than London (7.8%) and England (8.9%).
- The overall proportion of residents providing unpaid care decreased by -2.2% points since 2011. Although the proportion of residents providing unpaid care for 20-49 hours per week has increased slightly.
- Possible reasons for lower local proportion providing care could be higher percentage of young adults in the borough who are single, couples without children and adults likely living away from their parents and other family members
- In England, there was a higher proportion of people providing unpaid care in areas of higher deprivation.
- In England and Wandsworth, females reported providing more unpaid care than males, with the majority aged 50-59 years.

Census 2021 asked "Do you look after, or give any help or support to, anyone because they have long-term physical or mental health conditions or illnesses, or problems related to old age?". People were asked to exclude anything they did as part of their paid employment. This is different from the 2011 Census question, which began "Do you look after, or give any help or support to family members, friends, neighbours or others".

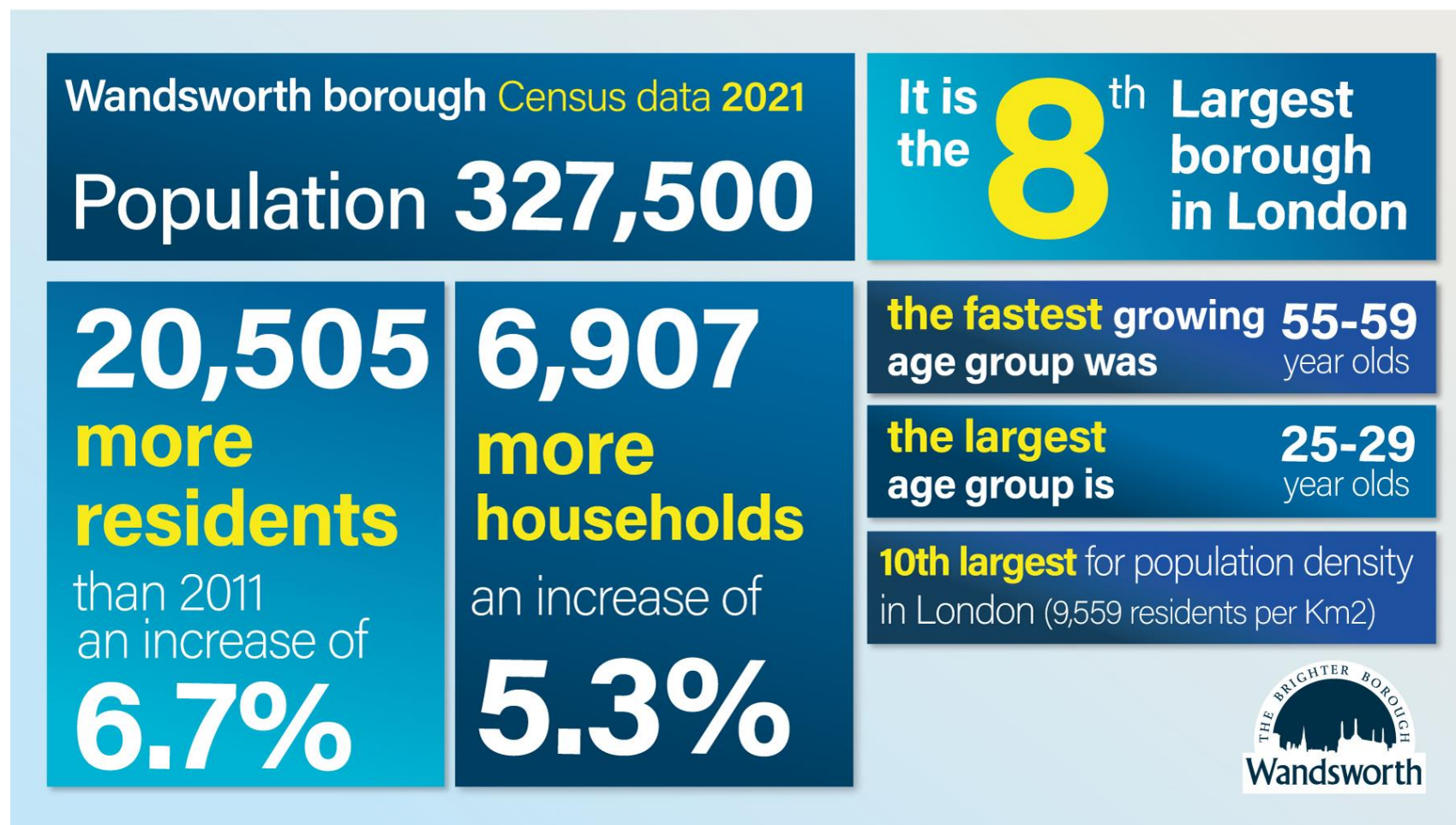

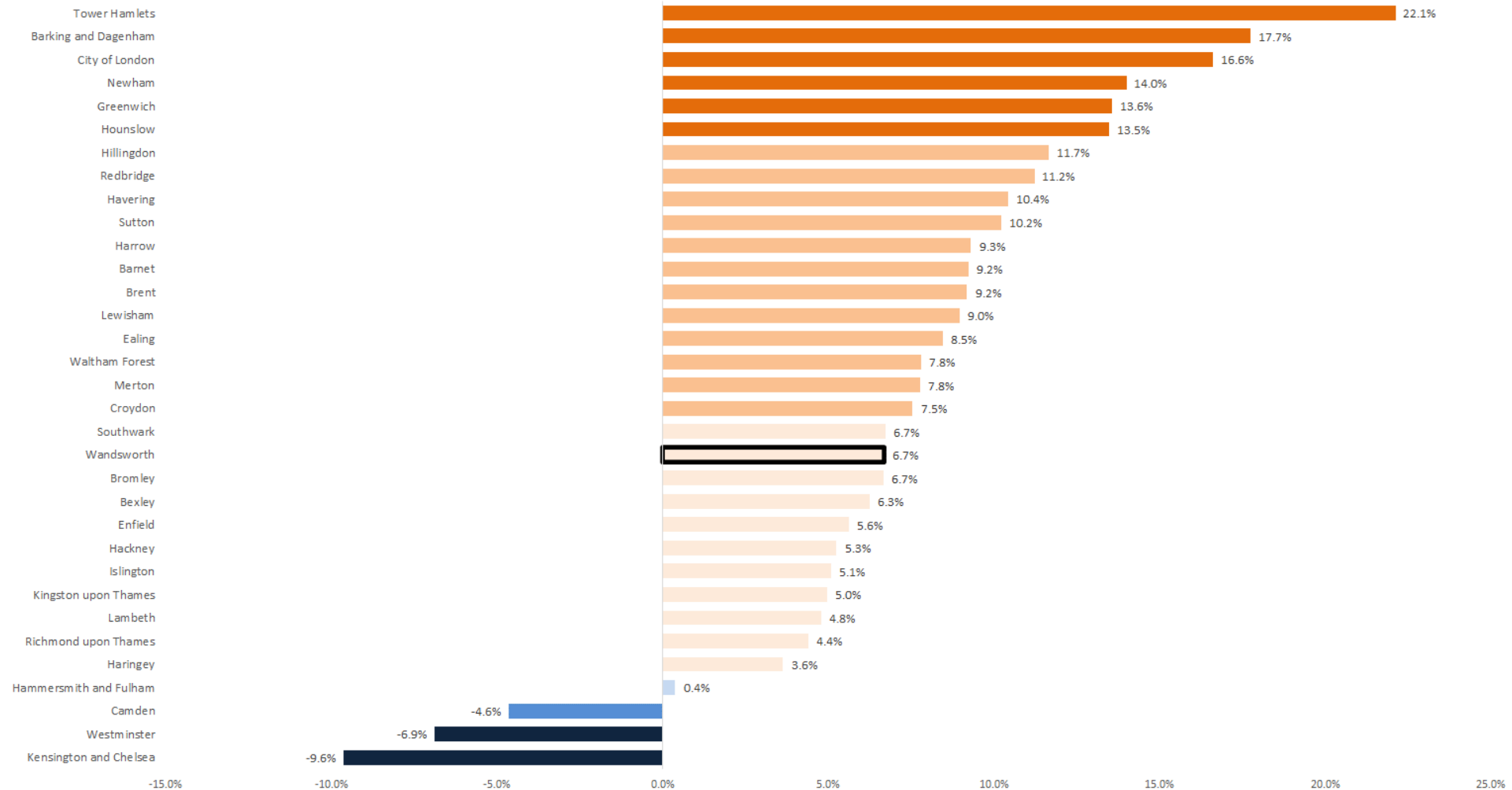

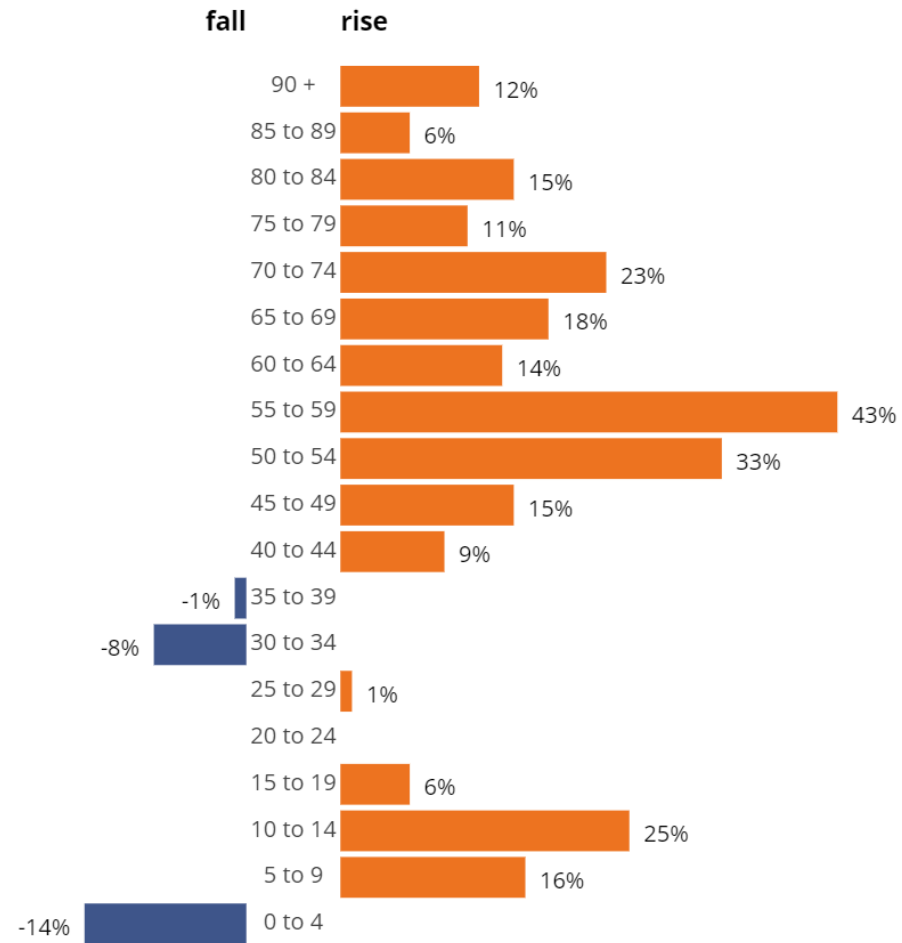
Population change of local authorities in London between 2011 and 2021
